INTRODUCTION

2002-03 marked the ACAC's 38th year of service in the provision of competitive post - secondary sport opportunities for Alberta's ever expanding college student population. From its humble beginnings in 1964, when five member institutions fielded men's basketball teams in the former Western Inter-College Conference, the ACAC boasted eighteen member institutions in 2002-03 with the addition of the University of Calgary as a guest member participating in two sports. College athletes competed in fourteen athletic activities. The number of annual ACAC participants has correspondingly increased from approximately 50 in 1964-65 to over 1,850 in 2002-03. During the course of its existence, the ACAC has positively impacted the lives of over 32,000 individuals by fostering a climate of growth, development and education through competitive sport. Ultimately, many of these ACAC graduates became valuable leaders in the framework of Alberta sport.

By virtue of the fact that ACAC teams and individuals have won more medals than any other provincial college athletic conference in Canadian College Athletics Association (CCAA) national championship competitions, the ACAC is widely regarded as the pre-eminent college athletic conference in Canada. Alberta's post-secondary student athletes are fortunate to have the opportunity to pursue their academic and athletic aspirations at the finest collection of post secondary institutions assembled in any Canadian province.

This annual report chronicles the activities and results of the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference during the period of July 1, 2002 through to June 30, 2003. Key developments and activities are described in the "2002-03 in Review" section which follows this introduction, and in the Executive Reports found in Appendix 1. Appendix II contains the statistical story of 2002-03. 2002 – 2003 in Review

MEMBERSHIP

The number of participating institutions in the ACAC grew to sixteen in 1996/97 with the admission of Briercrest Bible College and The King's University College into the Conference. Briercrest Bible College, located in Caronport, Saskatchewan, was granted "guest playing privileges" and became the first non-Alberta institution to compete in the ACAC. BBC Clipper teams competed in the ACAC's South Division men's and women's basketball and volleyball. The King's University College in Edmonton joined the ACAC's North Division, competing in men's and women's basketball only. In 1997/98, both colleges increased their participation with BBC joining men's hockey and TKUC joining men's and women's volleyball in the North Division. Grant MacEwan College also joined men's hockey for the 1997-98 season; CUCA joined women's and men's basketball in 1999-00, and Portage College joined men's and women's volleyball in 2001-02. Olds College rejoined the ACAC as a guest member in 2001-02 in sports of golf and curling after a seven year absence. The University of Calgary joined in 2002-03 as a guest member in golf and women's hockey while The King's University College and Keyano College joined competition in soccer.

The eighteen institutions who participated in the 2002-03 regular season included sixteen private and/or public colleges and two technical institutes. Three institutions were officially designated as university colleges and are among eleven ACAC institutions which have full degree granting status. Furthermore, eleven institutions were categorized as "full" members of the Conference, five were classified as "associate" members and two were "guest" members. The number of activities into which an institution chooses to enter determines membership status. The primary advantage to institutions competing in a greater number of activities, and thus holding full membership status, is the privilege of appointing two voting delegates to the Conference Council, the association's main decision making body. Associate members are accorded only one voting delegate whereas guest members or institutions who enjoy guest playing privileges are entitled to have speaking privileges but no vote at Conference Council meetings.

Historically, new inquiries about membership were received in 1996-97 from Flathead Community College in Montana and the College of the Rockies in Cranbrook, B.C. Both of these colleges were informed that the ACAC Conference Council had placed a three-year moratorium (ended in June 2000) on new membership in order to allow the Conference to sufficiently adjust to its most recent expansion. In 1998-99, the ACAC office received new inquiries from Fairview College and Olds College (Olds College is a former member of the ACAC). During the 1999-00 term, St. Mary's College in Calgary and Northwest Bible College in Edmonton inquired about future membership. In 2000-01, Fairview College and Northwest Bible College, again, showed interest but did not make application to join. Subsequently, new inquiries were received from Northern Lakes College (Slave Lake), Muskwachees Cultural College (Hobbema), as well as the three Alberta Universities (U of A, U of C and U of L). Olds College made a formal

application and joined the ACAC as a guest member for 2001-02 in the sports of golf and curling.

Recently, the University of Calgary applied and was unanimously accepted as a "guest" member in women's hockey and golf for 2002-03. During the past year, membership enquiries were received from St. Mary's College in Calgary and Taylor University (formerly North American Baptist College) in Edmonton. In May 2003 however, the ACAC Conference Council elected to impose a second moratorium on new membership pending completion of a Conference review to be undertaken during the 2003-4 year.

ADMINISTRATION

The governance and management of the ACAC was efficiently undertaken during the 2002-03 season by an ACAC Executive Committee which included President Gregg Meropoulos (NAIT), Past President Bernie Masterson (CUCA), Vice President (Operations) Mark Kosak (MRC), Vice President (Finance) Tim Tollestrup (LCC), and Secretary Francois Fournier (GPRC). This committee met on seven occasions between July 1, 2002 and June 30, 2003. New staff included Executive Director Dr. Robert Day and Executive Assistant April Zucker who provided professional support to the membership from the ACAC office. Steven Phipps assumed the office of Commissioner replacing long-standing predecessor Garry Meadus. In 1997-98 Totally Informative Athletic Communications (TIAC) has continued to handle the ACAC statistical information since 1997-98. TIAC's current agreement with the Conference will expire in June 2004.

The ACAC Conference Council met on three occasions during the 2002-03 academic year. A one-day planning meeting was held at the Sheraton Grande in Edmonton in September. A four-day planning meeting was held at the Red Deer Lodge in Red Deer in December. The AGM, consisting largely of a business meeting, was held at the Mount Royal Hotel in Banff in May.

Once again, the Conference was able to achieve a high percentage of the objectives set out for itself in 2002-03 and re-oriented several of the major functions within the office.

FINANCES

ACAC Vice President (Finance), Tim Tollestrup, assumed the Conference's financial portfolio from Danny Medford (MHC) in December and supervised the day to day transactions undertaken by Executive Director Bob Day. Together, these individuals capably managed the finances of the ACAC and conducted a significant review aimed at restructuring the approved 2002-3 budget. Subsequently, a revised budget was approved at the May AGM and both 2003-4 and 2004-5 budgets were prepared to enable the Conference to assess the financial status of the ACAC in a more well-informed fashion. An external review of the ACAC's 2001-02 financial records was undertaken and completed by the accounting firm of Peterson Walker in the fall of 2002. Peterson Walker was contracted to perform an audit of the ACAC's 1999/00 financial records in the fall of 2000. A significant change in the management of the ACAC's financial accounting records took place in 1996/97 with the employment of Elvi

Clark as the ACAC's off-site office accounting consultant. On a monthly basis, Ms. Clark reviews all financial transactions into a Simply Accounting program and produces the monthly and year-end financial reports.

The ASRPW Foundation provided the ACAC with a grant of \$107,400.00 for the 2002-03 year. This grant is extremely important in helping to reduce ACAC expenses to the individual colleges. We were pleased to be advised in late spring that the Foundation grant to the Conference will be increased to \$123,500.

At year-end, the ACAC's overall financial situation resulted in an operating deficit which was balanced with a transfer of funds from the Conference's investments. The aforementioned financial review was intended to avoid future deficits after three consecutive years of deficit budgeting. Notwithstanding this deficit, the Conference presented net assets approximating \$150,000 at year end! The Conference conducted a casino in November 2002 realizing in excess of \$70,000 from this event. Fifty percent of these funds were allocated to the 2002-3 budget while the remaining funds shall be allocated to the 2003-04 budget. Pending successful marketing overtures, a modest surplus may be realized in 2003-4. All operating surpluses are invested into low risk investments which provide protection for the ACAC in the event of any future catastrophic financial crisis.

PARTICIPATION AND COMPETITION RESULTS

In 2002-03, a total of 1,859 male and female athletes competed in thirteen sanctioned league or tournament sports. A breakdown of participation by sport, gender and institution can be examined in Table 2 of Appendix II. Final college placements in all activities are located in Table 3 of Appendix II.

Once again, ACAC teams were considered amongst the finest in Canada. For complete CCAA Championship results, see Table 9 of Appendix II.

INDIVIDUAL HONOURS AND AWARDS

Thirteen ACAC athletes were distinguished as CCAA All-Canadians in their respective sports for the 2002-03 season (see Table 11 Appendix II). In addition, twenty-five athletes were named CCAA Academic All-Canadians, an award which recognizes those student-athletes who combine athletic and academic excellence (see Table 15 of Appendix II). ACAC athletes truly symbolize the ACAC motto of "Combining Athletic and Academic Achievement".

Other CCAA awards featured in this publication include ACAC athletes chosen as tournament all-stars at the CCAA National Championships (Table 14) and the CCAA Athletes of the Month (Table 15) selected from the ACAC. The CCAA also named three athletes as "Player of the Year" (Table 12), and two coaches "Coach of the Year" (Table 13).

Tables 4 through 7 list the recipients of individual ACAC Awards in 2002-03. These tables include the 140 All-Conference Award recipients (Table 4), three ACAC Hockey

Award winners (Table 5), fifteen ACAC Coaches of the Year (Table 6) and 321 ACAC Academic Athletic Award recipients (Table 7).

FINANCIAL AID TO ATHLETES

Financial aid received by ACAC athletes through the Jimmie Condon Scholarship program administered by the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund totaled \$1,742,400.00 for the 2002-03 activity year. A complete scholarship breakdown by sport and institution is located in Tables 17 of Appendix II.

A SUMMARY OF KEY ACAC DEVELOPMENTS JN 2002-3

- The Conference welcomed two new employees at the beginning of the 2002-3 year. Dr. Robert Day, longtime athletic director at The King's University College and current ACAC President assumed the mantle of the Executive Director. April Zucker joined the staff as the Executive Assistant from the Red Deer College athletics department. Both brought invaluable ACAC experience and professional expertise to the office and the Conference. In addition, new Commissioner Steven Phipps joined the Conference.
- Unusually, only one ACAC member institution hosted a CCAA National Championship in 2002-3. Red Deer College hosted the inaugural CCAA Cross Country Running Championship in November. For 2003-4, Grant MacEwan College was approved as the host of the 2004 Men's Volleyball Championships as part of the normal CCAA annual host rotation for these sports.
- A new North/South soccer scheduling format was introduced last season with the addition of TKUC and Keyano into soccer circles. This format entailed the re-alignment of teams from North and South Divisions where an eight game format was introduced. In response to concerns that the number of games was insufficient, an expanded 13 game, partial interlock format.
- The Ron Lavery Fair Play Awards program was in its seventh year. During the 2002-03 season, three Fairplay Award recipients (King's/SAIT, Mount Royal and NAIT) were recognized.
- The financial foundation of the Conference was assured once again by the Alberta Sport, Recreation Parks & Wildlife Foundation by their contribution of a grant in the amount of \$107,400 for the administration of college sport in Alberta.
- **Subway** concluded a fourth year of an extremely generous program of support for ACAC athletics. The program included the sponsorship of Player of the Week awards (6' party subs) and a \$1000 cash subsidy to each member college.
- **Elite Sportswear** of Edmonton continued to support the Conference by sponsoring the ACAC's 2002-3 CCAA National Championship Badminton team.
- **Minolta** remained as an ACAC sponsor, providing two plain paper fax machines for use at the ACAC office and the Commissioner's office.
- **Kicks, The Original Soccer Store** of Calgary continued as the sponsor of the ACAC's Men's and Women's Soccer Championships for the seventh year.
- The Conference was pleased to welcome 13 hotel properties as partner host hotels for the provision of first class, affordable accommodation for our athletes, team staff and officials. New this year in most hosts was the availability of 25% discounts on food items for our travelling teams. Two year partnerships were concluded.

- Under the direction of the Marketing Committee and especially chairman Francois Fournier (GPRC), the Conference undertook to develop a Conference marketing plan whereby "official supplier", "preferred supplier", "title sponsorships" and other potential partnership agreements might be pursued with interested companies.
- The Conference received a casino in November, 2002. This event, staffed by members of the athletics departments of Grant MacEwan College and NAIT, raised in excess of \$70,000 for the ACAC. These funds are used largely to offset in part officiating costs in many of our sports in 2002-3 and 2003-4.
- The ACAC web site, which was introduced in 1997-98, received a major redesign and reconstruction which continues. In addition to basic descriptive information about the ACAC and its member colleges, weekly statistics and news releases, the new site provides an interactive portal for its members and shall provide additional information including Conference archival materials. Also new will be links to our valued sponsors. In the near future, player bios and real time scoring shall be available. The web site has tremendous potential for getting the ACAC message out.
- In keeping with our directive to provide leadership in the development of sport in Alberta, the Conference conducted an extensive review of ACAC soccer in order to ensure that we are providing a positive environment for those who wish to participate in the sport. As a result of this review, the Conference articulated a position which invites our officials to be partners with us in the development of our sport as an important aspect of the post-secondary educational enterprise in which we are engaged.
- The Conference produced three newsletters during the year. These were circulated through the colleges and via the Conference web site.
- An ACAC Fact Sheet was produced for distribution to the public through all college athletic publications.
- The publication featuring ACAC performance records, career scoring statistics and athletic historical information was produced and circulated.
- ACAC Participation Records were transferred to a newly created and more versatile database program in 2002-3 and have now become a readily accessible feature of the new, interactive web site.

APPENDIX I

EXECUTIVE REPORTS

Presidents Report ACAC AGM May 6-9, 2003

- I guess it is a sign of the times that the year has come and gone so quickly. It was a year of transition in the ACAC: a new ACAC office staff, changes in the Executive as well as new athletic directors and coaches. In spite of the challenges presented by change the ACAC has emerged even stronger and solidified our claim as the premier conference in the CCAA.
- In spite of some initial misgivings, I have enjoyed my first year as President and wish to thank the executive and office staff for their assistance. Unfortunately we lost two executive during the year, with the resignation of VP. Operations, Mark Kosak, and VP. Finance, Dan Medford, however thanks to Tim Tollestrup, who reclaimed the VP Finance position, we were able to survive the year and conduct the business of the conference.
- Bob and April at the ACAC office deserve a great deal of credit for the progress they have made in streamlining the office administration and saving the conference a good deal of money. They also make my job a lot easier. I look forward to the upgrading the ACAC website and utilizing the interactive site to speed up the processing of conference information.
- I would like to congratulate Red Deer College for successfully hosting the inaugural CCAA National Cross-Country Championships. In spite of some challenges from the elements, the event came off first class and set a standard for other hosts aim for. Thanks to Al Ferchuk, Brian Stackhouse and the entire organizing committee for putting together this memorable event.
- Thanks also to Steve Phipps who has stepped in and survived "trial by fire" in the role of ACAC Commissioner. New to the ACAC, Steve has brought a fresh insight to the position and has been quick to point out areas of ambiguity our Operating Code.
- I would encourage members of the council to consider letting their name stand for an executive position. While the learning curve may be steep it is very rewarding to make a positive contribution to the conference.
- Challenges that will have to be addressed in the near future by the ACAC include:
 1. How to maintain current levels of competition in light of the financial strain that a number of colleges are experiencing.
 2. Increased requests for ACAC membership and new teams for existing members.
 3. Wide range in levels of competitiveness within the conference.
 4. Potential loss of members or teams to Canada West/CIS.
 5. The impact of a rapid increase in the number of requests for Jimmie Condon Scholarships.
 6. The increased costs of transporting officials to areas where the level of officiating is not up to standard.
 7. Ongoing problems with Coach/Official/Athlete relationships.

**REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR
2003 ACAC AGM
May 6-9/03
Banff, Alberta**

It is my pleasure to submit my first report since assuming the position of Executive Director with the ACAC. The change has been an excellent one for me, both from a professional and a personal perspective.

Needless to say, it was a difficult few months for the Executive Committee and for staff personally preceding the beginning of my tenure owing to my predecessor's lengthy absence resulting from surgery and the resignation of both staff almost simultaneously during the summer.

I, and the Conference were fortunate to welcome April Zucker to the Office in the position of Executive Assistant. Not only did April bring essential experience having served five years in the athletics offices at Red Deer College, but her enthusiasm, patience and work ethic made the transition period more bearable. I continue to be thankful for her assistance daily. I am also thankful that I was able to recruit Steve Phipps to fill our Commissioner's position. I believe he has brought a unique and valuable perspective to the Conference.

Among the more noteworthy projects we have introduced are the following:

- * Marketing – enhanced Subway deal; Elite sponsorship
- * Casino – review of funds usage with lotteries Board
- * Soccer – challenge to be leaders in the sport in Alberta through a more positive approach to coach/player interaction
- * Budget – review of Conference budgeting
- * Operating Code Review – securing of a reputable sport-minded legal firm to conduct a review of the Conference Operating Code at a reasonable cost
- * Web Site – design of an interactive web site for Conference
- * Host Hotel Agreements – formalization of the procedure and enhanced sponsorship through the bid process
- * Officials – improved communication, relations and the introduction of the notion of a working partnership between our members and our officials

The following summarizes and highlights the key activities, events, programs, and projects administered for the 2002-3 activity year:

1. Personnel

- (a) Dr. Robert Day was hired, effective August 1, as the Executive Director of the Conference. In accepting the position, Dr. Day resigned as President of the ACAC, an office which was assumed by Gregg Meropoulos (NAIT). Gregg was subsequently approved by the membership.
- (b) April Zucker, Executive Assistant, was hired August 12. She has been an asset and a welcome addition in the ACAC office.
- (c) We chose not to apply for a U of A practicum student to help in the office for the 2002-3 year. We anticipate resubmitting our application in 2003-4.
- (d) Steven Phips, first year Commissioner, worked very closely with the ACAC office and contributed significantly to Conference operations.
- (e) TIAC has renewed a two year agreement to provide ACAC statistics. TIAC has now completed a six year working relationship with the Conference. All concerned are very pleased with the work done by TIAC (Darren Aughtry). TIAC's records will be incorporated into the new archival feature of the interactive web site in the fall of 2003.
- (f) The ACAC web site had **87,380** hits as of April 2, 2002. This is an extremely important mode of communication for the ACAC.

In the event my term as Commissioner is continued, I look forward to next year and to the challenges that undoubtedly lie ahead. I also encourage feedback at any time from any athletic director on how I may do a better job in the position of Commissioner.
