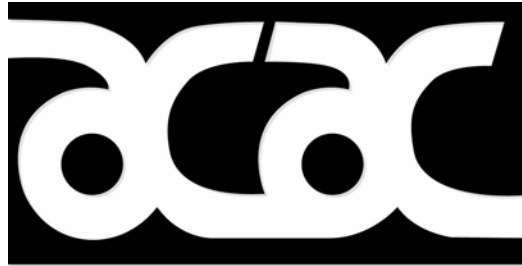

INTRODUCTION

2003-04 marked the ACAC's 39th year of service in the provision of competitive post - secondary sport opportunities for Alberta's ever expanding college student population. From its humble beginnings in 1964, when five member institutions fielded men's basketball teams in the former Western Inter-College Conference, the ACAC boasted eighteen member institutions in 2003-04. College athletes competed in thirteen athletic activities. The number of annual ACAC participants has correspondingly increased from approximately 50 in 1964-65 to over 1,855 in 2003-04. During the course of its existence, the ACAC has positively impacted the lives of over 32,000 individuals by fostering a climate of growth, development and education through competitive sport. Ultimately, many of these ACAC graduates became valuable leaders in the framework of Alberta sport.

By virtue of the fact that ACAC teams and individuals have won more medals than any other provincial college athletic conference in Canadian College Athletics Association (CCAA) national championship competitions, the ACAC is widely regarded as the pre-eminent college athletic conference in Canada. Alberta's post-secondary student athletes are fortunate to have the opportunity to pursue their academic and athletic aspirations at the finest collection of post secondary institutions assembled in any Canadian province.

This annual report chronicles the activities and results of the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference during the period of July 1, 2003 through to June 30, 2004. Key developments and activities are described in the "2003-04 in Review" section which follows this introduction, and in the Executive Reports found in Appendix 1. Appendix II contains the statistical story of 2003-04. 2003 – 2004 in Review

MEMBERSHIP

The number of participating institutions in the ACAC grew to sixteen in 1996/97 with the admission of Briercrest Bible College and The King's University College into the Conference. Briercrest Bible College, located in Caronport, Saskatchewan, was granted "guest playing privileges" and became the first non-Alberta institution to compete in the ACAC. BBC Clipper teams competed in the ACAC's South Division men's and women's basketball and volleyball. The King's University College in Edmonton joined the ACAC's North Division, competing in men's and women's basketball only. In 1997/98, both colleges increased their participation with BBC joining men's hockey and TKUC joining men's and women's volleyball in the North Division. Grant MacEwan College also joined men's hockey for the 1997-98 season; CUCA joined women's and men's basketball in 1999-00, and Portage College joined men's and women's volleyball in 2001-02. Olds College rejoined the ACAC as a guest member in 2001-02 in sports of golf and curling after a seven year absence. The University of Calgary joined in 2002-03 as a guest member in golf and women's hockey while The King's University College and Keyano College joined competition in soccer. Lakeland College joined ACAC competition in basketball in 2003-04.

The eighteen institutions who participated in the 2003-04 regular season included sixteen private and/or public colleges and two technical institutes. Three institutions were officially designated as university colleges and are among eleven ACAC institutions which have full degree granting status. Furthermore, eleven institutions were categorized as "full" members of the Conference, five were classified as "associate" members and two were "guest" members. The number of activities into which an institution chooses to enter determines membership status. The primary advantage to institutions competing in a greater number of activities, and thus holding full membership status, is the privilege of appointing two voting delegates to the Conference Council, the association's main decision making body. Associate members are accorded only one voting delegate whereas guest members or institutions who enjoy guest playing privileges are entitled to have speaking privileges but no vote at Conference Council meetings.

Historically, new inquiries about membership were received in 1996-97 from Flathead Community College in Montana and the College of the Rockies in Cranbrook, B.C. Both of these colleges were informed that the ACAC Conference Council had placed a three-year moratorium (ended in June 2000) on new membership in order to allow the Conference to sufficiently adjust to its most recent expansion. In 1998-99, the ACAC office received new inquiries from Fairview College and Olds College (Olds College is a former member of the ACAC). During the 1999-00 term, St. Mary's College in Calgary and Northwest Bible College in Edmonton inquired about future membership. In 2000-01, Fairview College and Northwest Bible College, again, showed interest but did not make application to join. Subsequently, new inquiries were received from Northern Lakes College (Slave Lake), Muskawchees Cultural College (Hobbema), as well as the three Alberta Universities (U of A, U of C and U of L). Olds College made a formal

application and joined the ACAC as a guest member for 2001-02 in the sports of golf and curling.

Recently, the University of Calgary applied and was unanimously accepted as a "guest" member in women's hockey and golf for 2002-03. During the past year, membership enquiries were received from St. Mary's College in Calgary and Taylor University (formerly North American Baptist College) in Edmonton. At the current time, St. Mary's College remains interested in joining the Conference however in May, 2004 the ACAC Conference Council elected to extend the moratorium on new membership pending completion of Conference strategic planning currently underway.

ADMINISTRATION

The governance and management of the ACAC was efficiently undertaken during the 2003-04 season by an ACAC Executive Committee which included President Gregg Meropoulos (NAIT), Vice President (Operations) Yvonne Becker (AUC), Vice President (Finance) Bill Dean (MacEwan), and Member-at-Large Claire Paterson (TKUC). This committee met on seven occasions between July 1, 2003 and June 30, 2004. Office staff included Executive Director Dr. Robert Day and Executive Assistant Erin Cameron, who joined the Conference in September, 2003. Erin and Bob provided daily professional support to the membership from the ACAC office. Steven Phipps completed a second year term in the office of Commissioner. Totally Informative Athletic Communications (TIAC) continued to provide the ACAC statistical information as it had done since 1997-98. TIAC's agreement with the Conference expired in June, 2004 and owner Darren Aughtry elected not to continue the business.

The ACAC Conference Council met on three occasions during the 2003-04 academic year. A one-day planning meeting was held at Grant MacEwan College in Edmonton in September. A four-day strategic planning meeting was held at the Banff Park Lodge in Banff in December. The AGM, consisting largely of a business meeting, was held at the Banff Park Lodge in Banff in May.

Once again, the Conference was able to achieve a high percentage of the objectives set out for itself in 2003-04 and re-oriented several of the major functions within the office.

FINANCES

ACAC Vice President (Finance), Bill Dean, supervised the day to day transactions undertaken by Executive Director Bob Day. Together, these individuals capably managed the finances of the ACAC and provided updated information to the membership to enable the Conference to assess the financial status of the ACAC in a more well-informed fashion. An external review of the ACAC's 2002-03 financial records was undertaken and completed by the accounting firm of Peterson Walker in the summer of 2003. Peterson Walker will be contracted to perform an audit of the ACAC's 2003-04 financial records in the late summer of 2004. A significant change in the management of the ACAC's financial accounting records took place in 1996/97 with the employment of Elvi Clark as the ACAC's off-site office accounting consultant. On a

monthly basis, Ms. Clark reviews all financial transactions into a Simply Accounting program and produces the monthly and year-end financial reports.

The ASRPW Foundation provided the ACAC with a grant of \$123,500.00 for the 2003-04 year. This grant is extremely important in helping to reduce ACAC expenses to the individual colleges.

At year-end, the ACAC's overall financial situation resulted in a modest operating surplus. All operating surpluses are invested into low risk investments which provide protection for the ACAC in the event of any future catastrophic financial crisis.

The significant financial review completed during 2002-3 was intended to avoid future deficits after three consecutive years of deficit budgeting. Notwithstanding these deficits, the Conference presented net assets approximating \$150,000 at year end! Subsequent to this review, the Conference is now committed to realizing modest surpluses annually. This shall be managed by presenting conservative budgets which shall be balanced through the adjustment of membership fees. At the same time, the Conference remains committed in its search for possible marketing revenues. The Conference Council elected to implement a three year advance budgeting process in order to attempt to strategically plan for upcoming fiscal changes.

PARTICIPATION AND COMPETITION RESULTS

In 2003-04, a total of 1,855 male and female athletes competed in thirteen sanctioned league or tournament sports. A breakdown of participation by sport, gender and institution can be examined in Table 2 of Appendix II. Final college placements in all activities are located in Table 3 of Appendix II.

Once again, ACAC teams were considered amongst the finest in Canada. For complete CCAA Championship results, see Table 9 of Appendix II.

INDIVIDUAL HONOURS AND AWARDS

Fifteen ACAC athletes were distinguished as CCAA All-Canadians in their respective sports for the 2003-04 season (see Table 11 Appendix II). In addition, twenty-seven athletes were named CCAA Academic All-Canadians, an award which recognizes those student-athletes who combine athletic and academic excellence (see Table 15 of Appendix II). ACAC athletes truly symbolize the ACAC motto of "Combining Athletic and Academic Achievement".

Other CCAA awards featured in this publication include ACAC athletes chosen as tournament all-stars at the CCAA National Championships (Table 14) and the CCAA Athletes of the Month (Table 15) selected from the ACAC. The CCAA also named four athletes as "Players of the Year" (Table 12), and four coaches "Coaches of the Year" (Table 13). In addition, two ACAC student athletes were selected nationally as the CCAA "Athletes of the Year Across All Sports".

Tables 4 through 7 list the recipients of individual ACAC Awards in 2003-04. These tables include the 142 All-Conference Award recipients (Table 4), six ACAC Hockey Award winners (Table 5), fourteen ACAC Coaches of the Year (Table 6) and 329 ACAC Academic Athletic Award recipients (Table 7).

FINANCIAL AID TO ATHLETES

Financial aid received by ACAC athletes through the Jimmie Condon Scholarship program administered by the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund totaled \$2,307,600.00 for the 2003-04 activity year. A complete scholarship breakdown by sport and institution is located in Tables 17 of Appendix II.

The ACAC would like to acknowledge the significant financial support provided by the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund through the Jimmie Condon Scholarship program.

A SUMMARY OF KEY ACAC DEVELOPMENTS IN 2003-04

- The Conference welcomed one new employee at the beginning of the 2003-4 year. Erin Cameron joined the staff as the Executive Assistant in September, 2003.
- Unusually, only one ACAC member institution hosted a CCAA National Championship in 2003-04. Grant MacEwan College was host of the 2004 CCAA Mazda Men's Volleyball Championships as part of the normal CCAA annual host rotation.
- The Conference hosted the 2004 CCAA AGM at the Banff Park Lodge in June, 2004, thanks in part to the generous contribution of the Alberta Sport, Recreation, Parks & Wildlife Foundation.
- The Ron Lavery Fair Play Awards program was in its eighth year. During the 2003-04 season, one Fairplay Award recipient (Brad Karren of LCC WBB) was recognized.
- The financial foundation of the Conference was assured once again by the Alberta Sport, Recreation Parks & Wildlife Foundation by their contribution of a grant in the amount of \$123,500 for the administration of college sport in Alberta.
- **Subway** concluded a fifth year of an extremely generous program of support for ACAC athletics. The program included the sponsorship of Athlete of the Week awards (6' party subs) and a \$1,000 cash subsidy to each member college.
- **Adidas** was welcomed as the new sponsor of the ACAC Men's and Women's Soccer Championships.
- **Elite Sportswear** of Edmonton continued to support the Conference through "in kind" sponsorship.
- **Minolta** remained as an ACAC sponsor, providing two plain paper fax machines for use at the ACAC office and the Commissioner's office and a photocopier machine for the ACAC office.
- **Kicks, The Original Soccer Store** of Calgary continued as the sponsor of the ACAC Women's and Men's Soccer Championship Player of the Game awards for the seventh year.
- The Conference was pleased to welcome 13 hotel properties as partner host hotels for the provision of first class, affordable accommodation for our athletes, team staff and officials. New this year in most hosts was the availability of 25% discounts on food items for our travelling teams. Two year partnerships were concluded and shall continue through the 2004-5 season.
- The ACAC web site, which was introduced in 1997-98, received a major redesign and reconstruction which continues. In addition to basic descriptive information

about the ACAC and its member colleges, weekly statistics and news releases, the new site provides an interactive portal for its members and shall provide additional information including Conference archival materials which was launched in June, 2004. Also new are links to our valued sponsors. In the coming year, player bios shall be available at the discretion of our member colleges. The web site continues have tremendous potential for getting the ACAC message out.

- The Conference produced three newsletters during the year. These were circulated through the colleges and via the Conference web site.
- An ACAC Fact Sheet was produced for distribution to the public through all college athletic publications.
- The annual publication featuring ACAC performance records, career scoring statistics and athletic historical information was updated and transferred to the Conference website.
- ACAC Participation Records too were transferred to a newly-created and more versatile database program in 2002-3 and have now become a readily accessible feature of the new, interactive web site.

APPENDIX I

EXECUTIVE REPORTS

ACAC President's Report May 2004, AGM

At the conclusion of another outstanding year of intercollegiate athletics, I would like to thank all ACAC members for maintaining a standard of excellence that makes the ACAC the pre-eminent conference in Canada. Congratulations to those members who captured CCAA and ACAC championships this season.

I would like to recognize and thank Bill Dean and his group from Grant MacEwan for the job that they did this year as host of a most successful Men's Volleyball Championships. Your efforts furthered the reputation our conference has for hosting first class events. The ACAC will get one more opportunity to show Canada our hospitality at the 30th annual CCAA AGM in Banff, May 31-June 4. Thank you to Bob Day and the organizing committee for your work to date. I welcome "ya'll" to join us in showing the rest of Canada what western hospitality is all about.

The ACAC will play host to a number of Championships next year and I would like to thank those colleges who have accepted this challenge.

- Men's Basketball @ NAIT

Issues

- This year the Conference dedicated a great deal of time and effort at our winter meetings to a consideration of altering the competitive formats of some of our sports. This work was undertaken to address the widening competitive gap that has developed, between some conference members as the league expanded. I hope the council will seriously consider positioning the conference so that we can accommodate both an increased level of competitiveness and also allow for the addition of either new colleges to the conference or additional sports offerings by member colleges.
- It appears that there will be no increase to the level of funding for the Jimmie Condon Scholarships program. At present the program does not have enough funds to meet existing JC. Scholarships demands, if 100% of the applicants qualified. This will have major implications for both new sport and new college applications.
- It behooves all athletic directors to take an active role in addressing those behaviors by your coaches and athletes that reflect poorly on your college and the conference. Simply relying on the commissioner to hand out sanctions will not resolve the problem in itself.

This year the Conference lost a true ACAC pioneer and friend with the recent passing of long time Red Deer College Basketball coach, Wayne Lalor. Much of what the ACAC is today can be traced to the efforts of senators like Coach Lalor. My sincere condolences go out to the Lalor family and Red Deer athletics. He will be missed.

I would like to acknowledge and thank the ACAC Executive Director, Bob Day, Executive Assistant, Erin Cameron, Commissioner Steve Phipps and the entire Executive for their efforts on behalf of the ACAC this year. We continue to be the best-administered conference in the country.

ACAC Executive Director's Report May 2004, AGM

During the 2003-4 academic year, the ACAC office continued to focus our energies so as to be of service to our member colleges and the Conference. In general, we were pleased to be able to provide assistance which enabled the Conference to function in an effective fashion.

Not unlike the previous year, the Office realized some disruption in late August with the sudden departure of Executive Assistant April Zucker to a position with the World Master's Games organizing committee. Not only was I disappointed to lose April personally, but it was clear the Office would be understaffed again immediately during perhaps our busiest time of the year. As it turned out, the Office was understaffed for four weeks until I and the Conference were fortunate to welcome Erin Cameron to the Office. Erin brought Percy Page Centre experience having worked in the building for two years prior to her appointment. This experience provided her with invaluable knowledge pertinent to the functioning of the building. Furthermore, Erin had spent a fall semester in the ACAC Office as a U of A practicum student. This experience provided her with a general understanding of the Conference and the duties characteristic of the fall semester. This experience, combined with her enthusiasm, patience and work ethic made the transition period more bearable.

Also, we were successful in securing U of A placement student Jennifer Telfer in the Office during the winter semester. Jennifer, a U of A Pandas and ex-GPRC Wolves volleyball player, experienced much of the ACAC winter semester operation and took on the research and development of the "ConfLink" archive project, which we now enjoy on the web site.

We were pleased too that Steven Phipps returned to our Commissioner's position for a second year and was able to continue to offer the Conference his services. I believe he continues to bring a unique and valuable perspective to the Conference.

Generally speaking, we are very pleased with what we have been able to accomplish during the past year. At Council's direction, significant time was focused on marketing initiatives and some successes were realized. Unfortunately, "reflection-type" projects are placed "on the back burner" owing to the need to meet day to day business requirements. Office staffing is challenged to meet these day to day requirements which arise. The Conference's three year experience in having previously a third full-time staffer, compounded with the growth of the Conference, make the ACAC Office a very busy place.

Among the more noteworthy projects we have introduced during the year are the following:

- * Marketing – enhanced Subway deal; renewed Elite sponsorship; molded Sherwood Hockey agreement
- * Budget – provision of a comprehensive, easy to read budget review and proposal
- * Web Site – design and development of "ConfLink", the interactive web site of the Conference (and, in particular, launching of the Conference archive)
- * Officials – continued improved communication and relations
- * Staffing – successful applications for (1) a U of A practicum student and (2) a STEP student grant
- * CCAA AGM – organized this ACAC-hosted event including the successful application for a ASRPWF hosting grant
- * ASRPWF - submitted an extensive, and well-received annual report to the Foundation

In closing, I am pleased to offer special thanks to the Executive Committee for assisting us with so many important tasks during the course of the year. I wish to extend particular thanks to President Gregg Meropoulos with whom I am in almost daily communication. Thanks too to our members and to our convenors and coaches who work to make the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference the pre-eminent conference in Canada. Thank you.

Commissioner Report

to the

2004 ACAC Spring Annual General Meeting

Included with this report please find:

1. Carry over suspensions from 2003/04; and
2. Infraction summaries for men's and women's basketball and hockey for 2003/04.

As discussed in my verbal presentation at the Annual General Meeting in May:

1. It appears the discipline policy implemented with respect to ACAC soccer competitions in 2003 was successful. It will be necessary to reinforce the policy with all stakeholder groups including coaches, players and officials to ensure continued improvement. Such reinforcement should occur prior to, and concurrent with, the beginning of the 2004 season.
2. The situation regarding the withdrawal of the AUC women's hockey team from ACAC competition was resolved amicably by the parties.
3. It appears the procedure implemented by the Conference Council with respect to complaints about officials is achieving the desired effect. In the long term I see this as significantly improving both the quality of officiating provided to the ACAC and the relationship between the Conference and its official's organizations.
4. I continue to review the provisions of the Operating Code with a view to suggesting possible amendments. At this time I do not see the need to make any specific recommendations although there are certainly areas that could be improved. I hope to make this a focus of my duties in 2004/05.
5. One provision of the Operating Code, however, is quite clear. Neither the Commissioner nor the Executive Committee has the authority to return a year of eligibility based solely on compassionate grounds. The only situation permitting the return of a year is where an injury limits a player to no more than 30% of the team's regular season games.

Overall in 2003/04 I experienced a certain degree of frustration in my ability to deal with ACAC matters in a timely fashion. I am hopeful my 'day job' workload was an anomaly and that the upcoming year will find me with far more time available to devote to the duties of Commissioner.

I look forward to my next year as Commissioner of the ACAC and to the continuing challenges presented by this position. As always I encourage feedback at any time from any Athletic Director on how I may do a better job.
