INTRODUCTION

2004-05 marked the ACAC's 40th year of service in the provision of competitive post - secondary sport opportunities for Alberta's ever expanding college student population. From its humble beginnings in 1964, when five member institutions fielded men's basketball teams in the former Western Inter-College Conference, the ACAC boasted eighteen member institutions in 2004-05. College athletes competed in thirteen athletic activities. The number of annual ACAC participants has correspondingly increased from approximately 50 in 1964-65 to 1,855 in 2004-05. During the course of its existence, the ACAC has positively impacted the lives of over 32,000 individuals by fostering a climate of growth, development and education through competitive sport. Ultimately, many of these ACAC graduates became valuable leaders in the framework of Alberta sport.

By virtue of the fact that ACAC teams and individuals have won more medals than any other provincial college athletic conference in Canadian College Athletics Association (CCAA) national championship competitions, the ACAC is widely regarded as the pre-eminent college athletic conference in Canada. Alberta's post-secondary student athletes are fortunate to have the opportunity to pursue their academic and athletic aspirations at the finest collection of post secondary institutions assembled in any Canadian province.

This annual report chronicles the activities and results of the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference during the period of July 1, 2004 through to June 30, 2005. Key developments and activities are described in the "2004-05 in Review" section which follows this introduction, and in the Executive Reports found in Appendix 1. Appendix II contains the statistical story of 2004-05. 2004 – 2005 in Review

MEMBERSHIP

The number of participating institutions in the ACAC grew to sixteen in 1996/97 with the admission of Briercrest Bible College and The King's University College into the Conference. Briercrest Bible College, located in Caronport, Saskatchewan, was granted "guest playing privileges" and became the first non-Alberta institution to compete in the ACAC. BBC Clipper teams competed in the ACAC's South Division men's and women's basketball and volleyball. The King's University College in Edmonton joined the ACAC's North Division, competing in men's and women's basketball only. In 1997/98, both colleges increased their participation with BBC joining men's hockey and TKUC joining men's and women's volleyball in the North Division. Grant MacEwan Community College also joined men's hockey for the 1997-98 season; Concordia University College of Alberta joined women's and men's basketball in 1999-00 and Portage College joined men's and women's volleyball in 2001-02. Olds College rejoined the ACAC as a guest member in 2001-02 in sports of golf and curling after a seven year absence. The University of Calgary joined in 2002-03 as a guest member in golf and women's hockey while The King's University College and Keyano College joined competition in soccer. Lakeland College joined ACAC competition in basketball in 2003-04. Finally, Grande Prairie Regional College joined the Conference soccer ranks in 2004-5.

The eighteen institutions who participated in the 2004-05 regular season included sixteen private and/or public colleges and two technical institutes. Three institutions were officially designated as university colleges and are among eleven ACAC institutions which have full degree granting status. Furthermore, eleven institutions were categorized as "full" members of the Conference, five were classified as "associate" members and two were "guest" members. The number of activities into which an institution chooses to enter determines membership status. The primary advantage to institutions competing in a greater number of activities, and thus holding full membership status, is the privilege of appointing two voting delegates to the Conference Council, the association's main decision-making body. Associate members are accorded only one voting delegate whereas guest members or institutions who enjoy guest playing privileges are entitled to have speaking privileges but no vote at Conference Council meetings. Associate member Prairie Bible college announced their withdrawal from the Conference prior to the 2005 AGM.

Historically, new inquiries about membership were received in 1996-97 from Flathead Community College in Montana and the College of the Rockies in Cranbrook, B.C. Both of these colleges were informed that the ACAC Conference Council had placed a three-year moratorium (ended in June 2000) on new membership in order to allow the Conference to sufficiently adjust to its most recent expansion. In 1998-99, the ACAC office received new inquiries from Fairview College and Olds College (Olds College is a former member of the ACAC). During the 1999-00 term, St. Mary's College in Calgary and Northwest Bible College in Edmonton inquired about future membership. In 2000-01, Fairview College and Northwest Bible College, again, showed interest but did not make application to join. Subsequently, new inquiries were received from Northern

Lakes College (Slave Lake), Muskwachees Cultural College (Hobbema), as well as the three Alberta Universities (U of A, U of C and U of L). Olds College made a formal application and joined the ACAC as a guest member for 2001-02 in the sports of golf and curling.

During the past three years, membership enquiries were received from St. Mary's College in Calgary and Taylor University (formerly North American Baptist College) in Edmonton. At the current time, St. Mary's College remains interested in joining the Conference however in May, 2004 the ACAC Conference Council elected to extend the moratorium on new membership pending completion of Conference strategic planning currently underway.

ADMINISTRATION

The governance and management of the ACAC was efficiently undertaken during the 2004-05 season by an ACAC Executive Committee which included President Allan Ferchuk (RDC), Vice President (Operations) Yvonne Becker (Augustana), Vice President (Finance) Bill Dean (MacEwan), and Past-President Gregg Meropoulos (NAIT). This committee met on eight occasions between July 1, 2004 and June 30, 2005. Office staff included Executive Director Dr. Robert Day and Executive Assistant Erin Cameron, who was replaced while on maternity leave by Anthony Wong in January, 2005. Erin, Anthony and Bob provided daily professional support to the membership from the ACAC office. Steven Phipps completed a third year term in the office of Commissioner. Little Buddha Technologies provided the ACAC statistical information for the first time this past year.

The ACAC Conference Council met on three occasions during the 2004-05 academic year. A two-day planning meeting was held at Grant MacEwan College in Edmonton in September. A four-day strategic planning meeting was held at the Banff Park Lodge in Banff in December. The AGM, consisting largely of a business meeting, was held over four days at the Banff Park Lodge in Banff in May.

Once again, the Conference was able to achieve a high percentage of the objectives set out for itself in 2004-05 and re-oriented several of the major functions within the office.

FINANCES

ACAC Vice President (Finance), Bill Dean supervised the day to day transactions undertaken by Executive Director Bob Day. Together, these individuals capably managed the finances of the ACAC and provided updated information to the membership to enable the Conference to assess the financial status of the ACAC in a more well-informed fashion. An external review of the ACAC's 2004-05 financial records was undertaken and completed by the accounting firm of Peterson Walker in the early fall of 2004. Peterson Walker will be contracted to perform an audit of the ACAC's 2005-06 financial records in the late summer of 2006. A significant change in the management of the ACAC's financial accounting records took place in 1996/97 with the employment of Elvi Clark as the ACAC's off-site office accounting consultant. On a

monthly basis, Ms. Clark reviews all financial transactions into a Simply Accounting program and produces the monthly and year-end financial reports.

The ASRPW Foundation provided the ACAC with a grant of \$123,500.00 for the 2004-05 year. This grant is extremely important in helping to reduce ACAC expenses to the individual colleges.

At year-end, the ACAC's overall financial situation resulted in a substantive operating surplus intended to augment the Conference reserve which had fallen substantively during the years 2000 to 2003. The goal of the Conference is to establish a financial stabilization fund amounting to \$250,000 with the condition that the funds may only be accessed with Council approval. The intent of the fund is to provide the Conference with a two year recovery period should ASRPWF be withdrawn. All operating surpluses are invested into low risk investments which provide protection for the ACAC in the event of any future catastrophic financial crisis.

The significant financial review completed during 2002-3 was intended to avoid future deficits after three consecutive years of deficit budgeting. Notwithstanding these deficits, the Conference presented net assets approximating \$246,000 at year end, compared to \$206,000 the previous year! Subsequent to this review, the Conference is now committed to realizing modest surpluses annually. This shall be managed by presenting conservative budgets which shall be balanced through the adjustment of membership fees. At the same time, the Conference remains committed in its search for possible marketing revenues. The Conference Council elected to implement a three year advance budgeting process in order to attempt to strategically plan for upcoming fiscal changes.

PARTICIPATION AND COMPETITION RESULTS

In 2004-05, a total of 1,855 male and female athletes competed in thirteen sanctioned league or tournament sports. A breakdown of participation by sport, gender and institution can be examined in Table 2 of Appendix II. Final college placements in all activities are located in Table 3 of Appendix II.

Once again, ACAC teams were considered amongst the finest in Canada. For complete CCAA Championship results, see Table 9 of Appendix II.

INDIVIDUAL HONOURS AND AWARDS

Twenty-two ACAC athletes were distinguished as CCAA All-Canadians in their respective sports for the 2004-05 season (see Table 17 Appendix II). In addition, sixteen athletes were named CCAA Academic All-Canadians, an award which recognizes those student-athletes who combine athletic and academic excellence (see Table 17 of Appendix II). ACAC athletes truly symbolize the ACAC motto of *"Combining Athletic and Academic Achievement"*.

Other CCAA awards featured in this publication include ACAC athletes chosen as tournament all-stars at the CCAA National Championships (Table 15) and the CCAA

Athletes of the Month (Table 16) selected from the ACAC. The CCAA also named three athletes as "Players of the Year" (Table 13), but no ACAC coaches were named "Coaches of the Year" (Table 14). In addition, one ACAC student athletes were selected nationally as the CCAA "Athlete of the Year Across All Sports".

Tables 4 through 8 list the recipients of individual ACAC Awards in 2004-05. These tables include the 154 All-Conference Award recipients (Table 6), fourteen ACAC Coaches of the Year (Table 7) and 280 ACAC Academic Athletic Award recipients (Table 8).

FINANCIAL AID TO ATHLETES

Financial aid received by ACAC athletes through the Jimmie Condon Scholarship program administered by the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund totaled over \$1.8 million for the 2004-05 activity year. A complete scholarship breakdown by sport and institution is located in Table 17 of Appendix II.

The ACAC would like to acknowledge the significant financial support provided by the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund through the Jimmie Condon Scholarship program.

A SUMMARY OF KEY ACAC DEVELOPMENTS IN 2004-05

- The Conference welcomed one new replacement employee at the beginning of 2005. Anthnoy Wong joined the staff as the Executive Assistant January 15.
- Three ACAC member institutions hosted a CCAA National Championships in 2004-05. NAIT was host of the 2005 CCAA Men's Basketball Championships. SAIT was host of the 2005 CCAA Women's Basketball Championships and Grant MacEwan hosted the 2004 CCAA Open Cross-Country Running Championships.
- The financial foundation of the Conference was assured once again by the Alberta Sport, Recreation Parks & Wildlife Foundation by their contribution of a grant in the amount of \$123,500 for the administration of college sport in Alberta.
- **Subway** concluded a fifth year of an extremely generous program of support for ACAC athletics. The program included the sponsorship of Athlete of the Week awards (6' party subs), two \$500 ACAC Player of the Year Scholarships and \$1,000 cash subsidies to each member college.
- **Adidas and Elite Sportswear** of Edmonton continued to support the Conference through "in kind" sponsorship.
- **Konica Minolta** remained as an ACAC sponsor, providing two plain paper fax machines for use at the ACAC office and the Commissioner's office and a photocopy machine for the ACAC office.
- **Kicks, The Original Soccer Store** of Calgary continued as the presenting sponsor of the ACAC Women's and Men's Soccer Championship Player of the Game awards for the eighth year.
- The Conference was pleased to continue the second of its two year agreement with 13 hotel properties as partner host hotels for the provision of first class, affordable accommodation for our athletes, team staff and officials.
- The ACAC web site, which was introduced in 1997-98, continued to receive major redesign and reconstruction under the banner, Conflink. In addition to basic descriptive information about the ACAC and its member colleges, weekly statistics and news releases, the new site provides an interactive portal for its members and now provides additional information including Conference archival materials. Also available are links to our valued sponsors, player bios and detailed information on each of our member colleges. The web site continues have tremendous potential for getting the ACAC message out.
- The Conference produced three newsletters during the year. These were circulated through the colleges and via the Conference web site.

- An ACAC Fact Sheet was produced for distribution to the public through all college athletic publications.
- The annual publication featuring ACAC performance records, career scoring statistics and athletic historical information was updated and transferred to the Conference website.
- ACAC Participation Records have gone on-line and have now become a readily accessible feature of the new, interactive web site.

ACAC Executive Director's Report May 2005, AGM

It is my pleasure to submit my report covering the 2004-5 year. I am very pleased to have been of service to you, my colleagues, and the Conference during the past twelve months.

Again this year, the evaluation year started in a great fashion and it was with confidence that I looked forward to working with an assistant who had already experienced some of the annual work cycle. I enjoyed this situation from mid-October onward, but again, destiny changed this with the unexpected departure of Erin Cameron Jan. 5.

Both I, and the Conference were extremely fortunate that ACAC statistician and NAIT WVB assistant coach Anthony Wong was available and interested to assist us on an "as needed" basis. When's Erin's status became more clear three days later, Anthony committed to working in the Office as long as required (despite his normal summer employment plans). As you know, Erin has committed to return to the Office May 16 and Anthony will staff the position until then. I welcome his attendance at the AGM. Anthony has done an outstanding job throughout his tenure. Not only has he brought much-appreciated knowledge to the position, he has also brought an obvious passion for the Conference. My unbounded thanks go out to him for his dedicated, reliable service. I continue to be thankful for his assistance daily.

As it turns out, I am thankful we were unsuccessful in securing UofA placement student for the Office during the winter semester. It would have not been possible to supervise a student while at the same time struggling with orienting a new employee and keeping up to the general busyness of the Office. I am, however, pleased to report that we have secured a STEP grant for nine weeks this summer and that the Executive Committee has approved the appointment of Jennifer Telfer. Jennifer took on the research and development of the "ConfLink" archive project last year and she will continue with that development and a couple other noteworthy projects this summer.

Generally speaking, we are very pleased with what we have been able to accomplish during the past year. I believe I provided the membership with suitable support throughout the year and I believe I have served the Conference well.

Unfortunately, "reflection/research-type" projects continue to be placed "on the back burner" owing to the need to meet day to day business requirements. You heard about this earlier in my December Report. Subsequent to conducting an "audit" of sorts during the winter semester, as suggested at the December meetings, I developed a 2005-6 budget draft incorporating a third position in the Office. This position, which the Conference has enjoyed in the past, was approved by the Executive Committee with the 2005-6 budget in February. The memorandum to the Executive is appended for your information. You should note too that Anthony Wong has agreed to accept this position and we have an endorsement from the Executive Committee to offer him the position should the Council accept the Executive's recommendation that the position. With the recommendation comes a requirement that the Executive work closely with the ED to monitor the effectiveness of the position relative to the ED Work Plan.

Among the more noteworthy projects we have introduced are the following:

- Marketing – renewed Subway, Elite, Minolta, Kicks sponsorships; managed Sherwood Hockey agreement; pursued Pizza Hut POG sponsorship Budget – continued provision of a responsible, budget review and proposal comprehensive, easy to read; assumed payroll/HR responsibilities in house
- Officials – continued improved communication and Relations
- Staffing – successful applications for (1) a UofA practicum student and (2) a STEP student grant
- ASRPWF - submitted an extensive, and well-received annual report to the Foundation
- Jimmie Condon Scholarship – provided leadership in determination of the colleges' proposal for reduced allocations
- Professional Development – attended CCAA Soccer Nationals, Event IQ Seminar, Finance for Non-Profit Organizations, AB Gaming Training Session, ASRPWF Leadership Summit, Government of Canada ROE Web Seminar
- Office Profile – attended CCAA Soccer Nationals, attended numerous ACAC events including: 8 soccer matches, 12 volleyball matches, 26 basketball games, 6 women's hockey games, 23 men's hockey games, golf provincial championships and 1 badminton championship

I should emphasize that I continue to enjoy the position but am somewhat perplexed by the workload. Notwithstanding the fact I understand the commitment I have made, a conscious choice to attend numerous ACAC events, the amount of work in the Office daily is currently unmanageable. I believe the executive assistant is working efficiently and remains busy. Unlike many of our AD's, the ED does not balance overtime during the academic year with additional down time in the summer months. While I do not intend this note as a petition for summer time off, I do wish to emphasize the importance of adding the third position to the complement of Office staff so that daily work is more manageable.

In closing, I am pleased to offer special thanks to the Executive Committee for assisting us with so many important tasks during the course of the year. I wish to extend particular thanks to President Allan Ferchuk with whom I am in almost daily communication. Thanks too to you, our members and to our convenors and coaches who work to make the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference the pre-eminent conference in Canada. Thank you.

Commissioner Report to the **2005 ACAC Spring Annual General Meeting**

Included with this report please find the following records for 2004-05:

1. Carry over suspensions;
2. Protests and eligibility rulings; and
3. Infraction summaries.

The investigation into the incident at the Village Park Inn on October 30, 2004 (see Commissioner's December 2004 Report) continues. There is evidence of possible involvement by members of an ACAC school's men's soccer team. Allegations include both hazing of first year players and participation in generally disruptive activities in the hotel on the evening in question. However, at this time the investigation is not concluded and the matter is with the school for further investigation and comment.

As can be seen from the infraction summaries the year over year trends are either stable or decreasing with only one significant exception. There was a marked increase in the number of direct technical fouls in women's basketball from last season. Of note, however, is that male coaches accounted for 29 of the 41 direct technical fouls in this sport in 2004-05.

I have previously provided specific comments and suggestions to the Executive Director with respect to cumulative sanctions leading to suspensions in the sports of soccer, hockey and basketball. I understand these comments and suggestions will be passed on to the appropriate committee discussing issues relating to the Operating Code. I would be pleased to meet with the members of this committee to discuss any particular questions they may have. I propose to provide a summary of my suggestions on this topic during the oral presentation of this report.

One other area in the Operating Code continues to cause confusion amongst member schools. The rules with respect to Universal Transfer Forms are not as clear as they could be. These rules should be simplified and clarified so schools know exactly when such forms are required and at what point a transfer student athlete becomes eligible (i.e. filing of the form, confirmation by the ACAC of eligibility, or something else). Finally, the sanction for improperly playing a transfer athlete should be made clear. To date I have dealt with these on a case by case basis. I don't think this is satisfactory in the long run. If the rules are clear, and there is a contravention, it would appear automatic forfeiture is the appropriate sanction in all cases.

Finally, I believe two recent incidents involving ACAC member schools deserve brief mention in this report. The first has to do with a complaint made by one school against

another with respect to a basketball talent identification camp. The allegation was that a student athlete who had played for a different ACAC school last season was allowed to participate without having applied to the school conducting the camp. If true, this would appear to be a contravention of the Operating Code. However, upon raising this allegation with the school operating the camp documents were immediately provided showing the student in question had confirmed his application, provided a student ID number and was listed on the school's student application system. Clearly the allegation was without merit. When advised of this, the school registering the complaint expressed surprise and indicated they had been misled by information from the student. I mention this to show the importance of checking the facts before triggering a formal investigation by the Commissioner. There is no reason in these circumstances why the school with the concern could not have simply called the school conducting the camp, explained what they had been told, and sought confirmation of the true state of affairs. I would expect schools to work together to resolve differences wherever possible and only to resolve the Commissioner if necessary.

The second has to do with a school playing a student athlete in two league matches when the athlete in question was known to be ineligible. This school had sought an eligibility ruling from the Commissioner in late January 2005. The student was ruled ineligible due to participation at another college in the same sport the previous semester. This ruling was not appealed by the school. This notwithstanding the school dressed and played the student athlete in two matches (both victories) in mid February. Of course, both matches were ultimately deemed forfeited to the opposing school. The explanation offered for playing this athlete was that one of the team's better players was injured and the results of the matches would not affect the overall standings in any event. This explanation is far from satisfactory. Intentionally playing an ineligible student athlete shows blatant disregard for the initial ruling and for the rules of the league in general. Although serious consideration was given to further sanctions against both the school and the student athlete (who I am sure was aware of her ineligibility) it was decided the forfeitures and the mention of my position on the matter in this report would suffice. However, should an incident such as this happen again similar leniency should not be expected.

If asked to do so, I would be pleased to serve another term as Commissioner of the ACAC. Even after three years there are continuing challenges presented by this position. As always I encourage feedback at any time from any Athletic Director on how I may do a better job.
