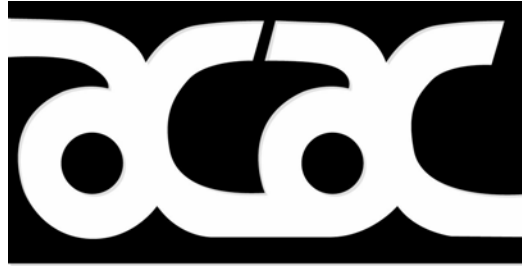

INTRODUCTION

2005-06 marked the ACAC's 41st year of service in the provision of competitive post - secondary sport opportunities for Alberta's ever expanding college student population. From its humble beginnings in 1964, when five member institutions fielded men's basketball teams in the former Western Inter-College Conference, the ACAC boasted seventeen member institutions in 2005-06. College athletes competed in thirteen athletic activities. The number of annual ACAC participants has correspondingly increased from approximately 50 in 1964-65 to 1,851 in 2005-06. During the course of its existence, the ACAC has positively impacted the lives of over 32,000 individuals by fostering a climate of growth, development and education through competitive sport. Ultimately, many of these ACAC graduates became valuable leaders in the framework of Alberta sport.

By virtue of the fact that ACAC teams and individuals have won more medals than any other provincial college athletic conference in Canadian College Athletics Association (CCAA) national championship competitions, the ACAC is widely regarded as the pre-eminent college athletic conference in Canada. Alberta's post-secondary student athletes are fortunate to have the opportunity to pursue their academic and athletic aspirations at the finest collection of post secondary institutions assembled in any Canadian province.

This annual report chronicles the activities and results of the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference during the period of July 1, 2005 through to June 30, 2006. Key developments and activities are described in the "2005-06 in Review" section which follows this introduction, and in the Executive Reports found in Appendix I. Appendix II contains the statistical story of 2005-06. 2005 – 2006 in Review

MEMBERSHIP

The number of participating institutions in the ACAC grew to sixteen in 1996-97 with the admission of Briercrest Bible College and The King's University College into the Conference. Briercrest Bible College, located in Caronport, Saskatchewan, was granted "guest playing privileges" and became the first non-Alberta institution to compete in the ACAC. BBC Clipper teams competed in the ACAC's South Division men's and women's basketball and volleyball. The College amended its name to Briercrest College (BC) in 2005. The King's University College, in Edmonton, joined the ACAC's North Division, competing in men's and women's basketball only in 1996-97. In 1997-98, both colleges increased their participation with BBC joining men's hockey and TKUC joining men's and women's volleyball in the North Division. Grant MacEwan Community College also joined men's hockey for the 1997-98 season; Concordia University College of Alberta joined women's and men's basketball in 1999-00 and Portage College joined men's and women's volleyball in 2001-02. Olds College rejoined the ACAC as a guest member in 2001-02 in sports of golf and curling after a seven year absence. The University of Calgary joined in 2002-03 as a guest member in golf and women's hockey while The King's University College and Keyano College joined competition in soccer. Lakeland College joined ACAC competition in basketball in 2003-04. Finally, Grande Prairie Regional College joined the Conference soccer ranks in 2004-5.

The seventeen institutions who participated in the 2005-06 regular season included fifteen private and/or public colleges and two technical institutes. Three institutions were officially designated as university colleges and are among eleven ACAC institutions which have full degree granting status. Furthermore, eleven institutions were categorized as "full" members of the Conference, four were classified as "associate" members and two were "guest" members. The number of activities into which an institution chooses to enter determines membership status. The primary advantage to institutions competing in a greater number of activities, and thus holding full membership status, is the privilege of appointing two voting delegates to the Conference Council, the association's main decision-making body. Associate members are accorded only one voting delegate whereas guest members or institutions who enjoy guest playing privileges are entitled to have speaking privileges but no vote at Conference Council meetings. Associate member Prairie Bible College announced their withdrawal from the Conference prior to the 2005 AGM.

Historically, new inquiries about membership were received in 1996-97 from Flathead Community College in Montana and the College of the Rockies in Cranbrook, B.C. Both of these colleges were informed that the ACAC Conference Council had placed a three-year moratorium (ended in June 2000) on new membership in order to allow the Conference to sufficiently adjust to its most recent expansion. In 1998-99, the ACAC office received new inquiries from Fairview College and Olds College (Olds College is a former member of the ACAC). During the 1999-00 term, St. Mary's College in Calgary and Northwest Bible College in Edmonton inquired about future membership. In 2000-01, Fairview College and Northwest Bible College, again, showed interest but did not

make application to join. Subsequently, new inquiries were received from Northern Lakes College (Slave Lake), Muskwachees Cultural College (Hobbema), as well as the three Alberta Universities (U of A, U of C and U of L). Olds College made a formal application and joined the ACAC as a guest member for 2001-02 in the sports of golf and curling.

During the past three years, membership enquiries were received from St. Mary's College in Calgary and Taylor University (formerly North American Baptist College) in Edmonton. At the current time, St. Mary's College remains interested in joining the Conference however in May, 2004 the ACAC Conference Council elected to extend the moratorium on new membership pending completion of Conference strategic planning currently underway. It is anticipated that the moratorium on participation in new sports will be lifted for current members in December while new membership applications may be received as early as May, 2007 for participation in the 2008-9 season.

ADMINISTRATION

The governance and management of the ACAC was efficiently undertaken during the 2005-06 season by an ACAC Executive Committee which included President Allan Ferchuk (RDC), Vice President (Operations) Yvonne Becker (Augustana), Vice President (Finance) Bill Dean (MacEwan), and Member-at-Large Wade Kolmel (KC). This committee met on eleven occasions between July 1, 2005 and June 30, 2006. Office staff included Executive Director Dr. Robert Day, Executive Assistant Erin Cameron, and Technical Assistant Anthony Wong. Erin, Anthony and Bob provided daily professional support to the membership from the ACAC office. Steven Phipps completed a fourth year term in the office of Commissioner.

The ACAC Conference Council met on three occasions during the 2005-06 academic year. A two-day planning meeting was held at Grant MacEwan College in Edmonton in September. A four-day strategic planning meeting was held at the Percy Page Center in Edmonton in December. The AGM, consisting largely of a business meeting, was held over four days at the Banff Park Lodge in Banff in May.

Once again, the Conference was able to achieve a high percentage of the objectives set out for itself in 2005-06 and re-oriented several of the major functions within the office.

FINANCES

ACAC Vice President (Finance), Bill Dean supervised the day to day transactions undertaken by Executive Director Bob Day. Together, these individuals capably managed the finances of the ACAC and provided updated information to the membership to enable the Conference to assess the financial status of the ACAC in a more well-informed fashion. An external review of the ACAC's 2004-05 financial records was undertaken and completed by the accounting firm of Peterson Walker in the early fall of 2005. Peterson Walker will be contracted to perform a review of the ACAC's 2005-06 financial records in the late summer of 2006. A significant change in the management of the ACAC's financial accounting records took place in 1996-97 with the

employment of Elvi Clark as the ACAC's off-site office accounting consultant. On a monthly basis, Ms. Clark reviews all financial transactions into a Simply Accounting program and produces the monthly and year-end financial reports.

The ASRPW Foundation provided the ACAC with a grant of \$123,500.00 for the 2005-06 year. The Conference has been informed it might expect a modest increase to that grant amount retroactive to April 1, 2006. This grant is extremely important in helping to reduce ACAC expenses to the individual colleges.

At year-end, the ACAC's overall financial situation resulted in a modest operating surplus intended to augment the Conference reserve which had fallen substantively during the years 2000 to 2003. The goal of the Conference is to establish a financial stabilization fund amounting to two years of ASRPWF grant monies, or \$250,000, with the condition that the funds may only be accessed with Council approval. The intent of the fund is to provide the Conference with a two year period of stable funding should the ASRPWF grant be withdrawn. All operating surpluses are invested into low risk investments which provide protection for the ACAC in the event of any future catastrophic financial crisis.

The significant financial review completed during 2002-3 was intended to avoid future deficits after three consecutive years of deficit budgeting. Notwithstanding these deficits, the Conference presented net assets approximating \$246,000 at year end, compared to \$206,000 the previous year! Net assets climbed to \$246,000 at the end of 2005. Subsequent to this review, the Conference is now committed to realizing modest surpluses annually until the reserve target amount is realized. This shall be managed by presenting conservative budgets which shall be balanced through the adjustment of membership fees. At the same time, the Conference remains committed in its search for possible marketing revenues. The Conference Council elected to implement a three year advance budgeting process in order to attempt to strategically plan for upcoming fiscal changes. This process continues in view of increasing inflationary challenges.

PARTICIPATION AND COMPETITION RESULTS

In 2005-06, a total of 1,851 male and female athletes competed in fourteen sanctioned league or tournament sports. A breakdown of participation by sport, gender and institution can be examined in Table 2 of Appendix II. Final college placements in all activities are located in Table 3 of Appendix II.

Once again, ACAC teams were considered amongst the finest in Canada. For complete CCAA Championship results, see Table 9 of Appendix II.

INDIVIDUAL HONOURS AND AWARDS

Eighteen ACAC athletes were distinguished as CCAA All-Canadians in their respective sports for the 2005-06 season (see Table 12 Appendix II). In addition, twenty-four athletes were named CCAA Academic All-Canadians, an award which recognizes those student-athletes who combine athletic and academic excellence (see Table 17 of

Appendix II). ACAC athletes truly symbolize the ACAC motto of *"Combining Athletic and Academic Achievement"*.

Other CCAA awards featured in this publication include ACAC athletes chosen as tournament all-stars at the CCAA National Championships (Table 15) and the CCAA Athletes of the Month (Table 16) selected from the ACAC. The CCAA also named four athletes as "Players of the Year" (Table 13), and three ACAC coaches were named "Coaches of the Year" (Table 14). In addition, two ACAC student athletes were selected nationally as the CCAA "Athlete of the Year Across All Sports".

Tables 4 through 8 list the recipients of individual ACAC Awards in 2005-06. These tables include the 156 All-Conference Award recipients (Table 6), twelve ACAC Coaches of the Year (Table 7) and 327 ACAC Academic Athletic Award recipients (Table 8).

FINANCIAL AID TO ATHLETES

Financial aid received by ACAC athletes through the Jimmie Condon Scholarship program administered by the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund totaled over \$1.7 million for the 2005-06 activity year. A complete scholarship breakdown by sport and institution is located in Table 17 of Appendix II.

The ACAC would like to acknowledge the significant financial support provided by the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund through the Jimmie Condon Scholarship program.

A SUMMARY OF KEY ACAC DEVELOPMENTS IN 2005-06

- The Conference welcomed one new employee position in the fall of 2005. Anthony Wong joined the staff as the Technical Assistant in September, 2005.
- Two ACAC member institutions hosted a CCAA National Championships in 2005-06. LCC was host of the 2006 CCAA Women's Basketball Championships and Mt. Royal was host of the 2006 CCAA Badminton Championships.
- The financial foundation of the Conference was assured once again by the Alberta Sport, Recreation Parks & Wildlife Foundation by their contribution of a grant in the amount of \$123,500 for the administration of college sport in Alberta.
- **Subway** concluded a sixth year of a generous program of support for ACAC athletics. The program included the sponsorship of Athlete of the Week awards (6' party subs), two \$1,000 ACAC Player of the Year Scholarships and \$1,000 cash subsidies to each member college.
- **adidas, Sher-Wood Hockey and Elite Sportswear** of Edmonton continued to support the Conference through "in kind" sponsorship and in the cases of the latter two, \$500 scholarships for our top hockey and basketball players. Adidas assumed the title sponsorship of the ACAC Soccer Championships.
- **Konica Minolta** remained as an ACAC sponsor, providing two plain paper fax machines for use at the ACAC office and the Commissioner's office, a photocopy machine for the ACAC office and scholarships for our top volleyball players.
- **Kicks, The Original Soccer Store** of Calgary continued as the presenting sponsor of the ACAC Women's and Men's Soccer Championship Player of the Game awards for the eighth year.
- The Conference was pleased to begin the first of its two year agreement with 10 hotel properties as partner host hotels for the provision of first class, affordable accommodation for our athletes, team staff and officials.
- The ACAC web site, updated to an interactive format recently and now called ConfLink, was introduced in 1997-98. In addition to basic descriptive information about the ACAC and its member colleges, weekly statistics and news releases, the new site provides an interactive portal for its members and now provides additional information including Conference archival materials. Also available are links to our valued sponsors, player bios and detailed information on each of our member colleges. The web site continues have tremendous potential for getting the ACAC message out. The Conference introduced the DakStats statistical software system in basketball and volleyball in 2005-6.
- The Conference produced three newsletters during the year. These were circulated through the colleges and via the Conference web site.

- An ACAC Fact Sheet was produced for distribution to the public through all college athletic publications.
- The annual publication featuring ACAC performance records, career scoring statistics and athletic historical information was updated and transferred to the Conference website.
- ACAC Participation Records have gone on-line and have now become a readily accessible feature of the new, interactive web site.

To do so would be a huge step forward in the promotion of student-life and athlete development opportunities within the province of Alberta.

The challenge is concurrently formidable and exciting. I look forward to the May AGM; see you in Banff.

ACAC Executive Director's Report May 2006, AGM

It is my pleasure to submit my report covering the 2005-06 year. I am very pleased to have been of service to you, my colleagues, and the Conference during the past twelve months.

Again this past year, the evaluation year was not without its extraordinary challenges. Owing to my diagnosis with in situ squamous cell carcinoma in my throat July 20, I entered the evaluation year uncertain as to my on the job effectiveness and specifically, the prognosis of the disease itself. Nevertheless, my personal philosophy dictated that I continue to conduct my life, work responsibilities included, in as normal a fashion as possible.

Both I, and the Conference were extremely fortunate that the decision had been made previously to introduce the Technical Assistant position and that Anthony Wong was available. In view of Anthony's work in the office the previous spring, he was well-prepared to assist Erin in assuming those duties I would be unable to handle.

That being said, I am very pleased that while I was out of the office, except for a couple hours/half days each week, between Oct. 3 and Nov. 4, I was able to continue to perform much of my work via e-mail owing to the availability of the Conference laptop computer purchased in the spring of 2005. This allowed me to remain completely up to speed on Conference business throughout the period and despite the loss of my voice for nearly seven weeks, I continued to be able to function as the Conference's Executive Director and to provide counsel as required.

For the most part, my condition limited my effectiveness largely in four principal areas:

- First, I was unable to complete projects which required ongoing work and focus, including scheduling and completion of the OC Review and the Commissioner's Handbook. Scheduling was completed upon my return in early November so this did not inconvenience the Conference insofar as the traditional timeline was maintained. The work on the Commissioner's Handbook is largely complete and requires review and verification only. It should be available on the Conference web site later this summer. The OC Review remains outstanding. Despite the introduction of the EA position, I continue to view this as a summer project.
- Second, I was not as readily available for daily counsel on issues. While I encouraged the staff and members to contact me electronically regarding any information they required, many were reluctant to do so. For that I believe I should be thankful although my personal work ethic required otherwise of me. I was able to assist as requested though.

- Third, I did not initiate as much “work” as I normally would. Whether this proved detrimental to Conference business I am not prepared to say. Some, in fact, probably consider it a positive, not unlike me losing my voice! In the final analysis however, I did not add to various agendas and the (positive???) effect of this may still be seen in meeting agendas of the Conference and of our coaches – agendas which are shorter. Of course, this may not be a bad thing!
- Lastly, except for two events, I did not attend Conference games during the fall semester. Whether this is a necessary function of the position or actually important in any way is perhaps debatable. Personally however, it left an empty spot in my personal work plan.

Members may be interested in hearing that I have recently graduated in my treatment regimen and now need to visit my oncologist and the ear, nose and throat specialist every third month rather than monthly.

As it turns out, I am thankful we were unsuccessful in securing UofA placement student for the Office during the fall, 2005 semester. It would have not been possible to supervise a student while at the same time struggling with my treatments and keeping up to the general business of the Office. Neither would this assistance have aided Erin and Anthony. I am, however, pleased to report that we have again secured a STEP grant for nine weeks this summer and that we appear to have once again secured the services of Jennifer Telfer. Jennifer took on the research and development of the “ConfLink” archive project last year and she will continue with that development and a couple other noteworthy projects this summer.

Generally speaking, we are very pleased with what we have been able to accomplish during the past year. The creation of the TA position proved to be a godsend in view of complications experienced with the introduction of DakStats to basketball and volleyball. I believe that despite my condition, I provided the membership with suitable support and leadership throughout the year and I believe I have served the Conference well.

Clearly, since my arrival in the office, we have assumed more and more of the duties which were previously completed by Executive members, committees, sport convenors and coaches. At the same time, we have become more proactive in initiating issues. I believe this administrative mentality, when combined with the addition of the TA position, has made our office operations particularly effective. Our goal shall continue to be to continue to do so. I am pleased the Executive Committee will recommend, by way of the proposed 2006-7 budget, that the TA position be retained.

Among the more noteworthy projects we have introduced are the following:

- Marketing – renewed Elite and Kicks sponsorships; enhanced Subway, Adidas and Sher-Wood agreements; managed Sher-Wood Hockey agreement; actively pursuing Subway POG sponsorship

- Budget – with the assistance of the VP, Finance . . . continued provision of responsible budgeting; provision of comprehensive, easy to read budget summaries; provision of a focused plan to build a Conference Reserve
- Officials – continued improved communication and relations; currently re-negotiating BB and VB contracts
- Staffing – successful applications for (1) a UofA practicum student and (2) a STEP student grant
- ASRPWF - submitted an extensive, and well-received annual report to the Foundation
- Jimmie Condon Scholarship – continue to provide leadership in determination of the colleges' proposal for reduced allocations
- Professional Development – none completed
- Office Profile – attended numerous ACAC events during the second semester including women's basketball championships, women's volleyball championships, women's hockey play-offs/championship games, men's hockey play-offs and Conference badminton championship

By way of this report, I do wish to raise an issue which, I believe, requires the attention of the Conference. It is my considered opinion that the revised committee structure of the Conference has proven to be particularly ineffective. The introduction of three, large committees has resulted in a stagnation where business simply is not being completed or is being left to the eleventh hour (and 45 minutes) such that many issues receive short shrift. At the same time, the large committees appear to not lend themselves to the development of the specific levels of expertise which provide the foundation for more well-informed decisions. This, combined with the abandonment of the annual ACAC Development Plan, may be responsible for what I sense to be an ineffective working committee format within the Conference. I would encourage the Conference to re-consider this structure.

In closing, I am pleased to offer special thanks to the Executive Committee for assisting us with so many important tasks during the course of the year. I wish to extend particular thanks to President Allan Ferchuk, with whom I am in almost daily communication, and our most effective Executive Committee. Thanks too to you, our members and to our convenors and coaches who work to make the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference the pre-eminent conference in Canada. Thank you.

Commissioner Report to the **2006 ACAC Spring Annual General Meeting**

Included with this report please find the following records for 2005-06:

1. Carry over suspensions;
2. Protests and eligibility rulings; and
3. Infraction summaries.

The infraction summaries show several apparently noteworthy trends. At first glance it appears there is a large increase in the total number of yellow cards issued in men's soccer over the previous season. However, this may very well be due to the reduced number of games played in the 2004 season due to the early snowfall. The total number of yellow cards issued in women's soccer showed no significant increase despite the increased number of games over the previous season. In men's hockey there was a large decrease in the total number of game misconducts issued during the season. This continues a trend that began the year before. Since the 2003-04 season total game misconducts have fallen from 132 to 62. Although the total number of games played is now slightly lower due to the withdrawal of one team this accounts for only a slight percentage of the reduction. Women's hockey also showed a significant decrease in the total number of game misconducts dropping from 12 in 2003-04 and 11 in 2004-05 to just two in 2005-06. There were no significant changes in the number of direct technical fouls issued in either men's or women's basketball.

There is a saying that if you torture statistics long enough they will admit to anything so I don't suggest any dramatic conclusions should be drawn from this summary. It is, however, useful to monitor the numbers annually.

During the 2005-06 season an Appeal Committee issued a significant ruling involving protests by KC and GPRC of the results in several volleyball matches against MacEwan (see Protests summary below). If the ruling of the Appeal Committee to forfeit all matches accurately reflects the will of the Conference then the Operating Code should be amended to make it clear that any use of an ineligible player, regardless of the circumstances, will result in a forfeit. The current wording of the Code appears to give the Commissioner discretion to choose from a range of sanctions depending on the facts of a particular case. This was the basis for the original ruling in these cases. However, the Appeal Committee ruling, for all intents and purposes, renders this discretion meaningless. For the record, I do not believe such a change is in the overall best interests of the Conference but at least it will remove the uncertainty that now exists as a result of the Appeal Committee ruling.

The 2005-06 season will be my final one as Commissioner of the ACAC. I have enjoyed my four years in the position and have learned much from observing the dedication with which everyone involved with the Conference serves the interests of amateur sports and education. I wish the Conference and all its member schools the very best in the future.
