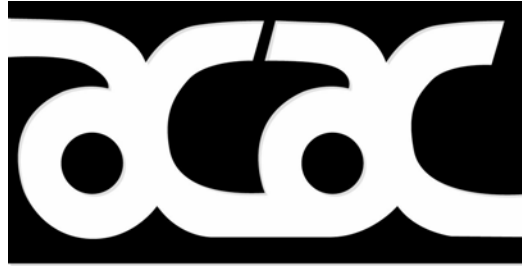

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INTRODUCTION

2006-07 marked the ACAC's 42nd year of service in the provision of competitive post - secondary sport opportunities for Alberta's ever expanding college student population. From its humble beginnings in 1964, when five member institutions fielded men's basketball teams in the former Western Inter-College Conference, the ACAC boasted seventeen member institutions in 2006-07. College athletes competed in thirteen athletic activities. The number of annual ACAC participants has correspondingly increased from approximately 50 in 1964-65 to 1,775 in 2006-07. During the course of its existence, the ACAC has positively impacted the lives of over 32,000 individuals by fostering a climate of growth, development and education through competitive sport. Ultimately, many of these ACAC graduates became valuable leaders in the framework of Alberta sport.

By virtue of the fact that ACAC teams and individuals have won more medals than any other provincial college athletic conference in Canadian College Athletics Association (CCAA) national championship competitions, the ACAC is widely regarded as the pre-eminent college athletic conference in Canada. Alberta's post-secondary student athletes are fortunate to have the opportunity to pursue their academic and athletic aspirations at the finest collection of post secondary institutions assembled in any Canadian province.

This annual report chronicles the activities and results of the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference during the period of July 1, 2006 through to June 30, 2007. Key developments and activities are described in the "2006-07 in Review" section which follows this introduction, and in the Executive Reports found in Appendix I. Appendix II contains the statistical story of 2006-07. 2006 – 2007 in Review

MEMBERSHIP

The number of participating institutions in the ACAC grew to sixteen in 1996-97 with the admission of Briercrest Bible College and The King's University College into the Conference. Briercrest Bible College, located in Caronport, Saskatchewan, was granted "guest playing privileges" and became the first non-Alberta institution to compete in the ACAC. BBC Clipper teams competed in the ACAC's South Division men's and women's basketball and volleyball. The College amended its name to Briercrest College (BC) in 2005. The King's University College, in Edmonton, joined the ACAC's North Division, competing in men's and women's basketball only in 1996-97. In 1997-98, both colleges increased their participation with BBC joining men's hockey and TKUC joining men's and women's volleyball in the North Division. Grant MacEwan Community College also joined men's hockey for the 1997-98 season; Concordia University College of Alberta joined women's and men's basketball in 1999-00 and Portage College joined men's and women's volleyball in 2001-02. Olds College rejoined the ACAC as a guest member in 2001-02 in sports of golf and curling after a seven year absence. The University of Calgary joined in 2002-03 as a guest member in golf and women's hockey while The King's University College and Keyano College joined competition in soccer. Lakeland College joined ACAC competition in basketball in 2003-04. Finally, Grande Prairie Regional College joined the Conference soccer ranks in 2004-5.

The seventeen institutions who participated in the 2006-07 regular season included fifteen private and/or public colleges and two technical institutes. Three institutions were officially designated as university colleges and are among eleven ACAC institutions which have full degree granting status. Furthermore, eleven institutions were categorized as "full" members of the Conference, four were classified as "associate" members and two were "guest" members. The number of activities into which an institution chooses to enter determines membership status. The primary advantage to institutions competing in a greater number of activities, and thus holding full membership status, is the privilege of appointing two voting delegates to the Conference Council, the association's main decision-making body. Associate members are accorded only one voting delegate whereas guest members or institutions that enjoy guest playing privileges are entitled to have speaking privileges but no vote at Conference Council meetings. Associate member Prairie Bible College announced their withdrawal from the Conference prior to the 2005 AGM.

Historically, new inquiries about membership were received in 1996-97 from Flathead Community College in Montana and the College of the Rockies in Cranbrook, B.C. Both of these colleges were informed that the ACAC Conference Council had placed a three-year moratorium (ended in June 2000) on new membership in order to allow the Conference to sufficiently adjust to its most recent expansion. In 1998-99, the ACAC office received new inquiries from Fairview College and Olds College (Olds College is a former member of the ACAC). During the 1999-00 term, St. Mary's College in Calgary and Northwest Bible College in Edmonton inquired about future membership. In 2000-01, Fairview College and Northwest Bible College, again, showed interest but did not

make application to join. Subsequently, new inquiries were received from Northern Lakes College (Slave Lake), Muskawchees Cultural College (Hobbema), as well as the three Alberta Universities (U of A, U of C and U of L). Olds College made a formal application and joined the ACAC as a guest member for 2001-02 in the sports of golf and curling.

During the past four years, membership enquiries were received from St. Mary's College in Calgary and Taylor University (formerly North American Baptist College) in Edmonton. The moratorium on participation was lifted at the May 2006 AGM and new applications were accepted in fall 2006. Portage College submitted a bid to add Men's Hockey to their program and Medicine Hat College applied to have Golf added. At the May 2007 AGM both programs were voted in by Council. The Golf team at Medicine Hat College will enter play in the 2007-08 season and the Portage College Men's Hockey is scheduled to begin league play in the 2008-09 season.

ADMINISTRATION

The governance and management of the ACAC was efficiently undertaken during the 2006-07 season by an ACAC Executive Committee which included President Dr. Ellery Pullman (Briercrest), Vice President (Operations) Wade Kolmel (Keyano), Vice President (Finance) Bill Dean (MacEwan), Vice President (Marketing) Kelly Almer (Medicine Hat College), and Past-President Allan Ferchuk (Red Deer College). This committee met on nine occasions between July 1, 2006 and June 30, 2007. Office staff included Executive Director Dr. Robert Day, Executive Assistant Leanne Dickau, and Technical Assistant Anthony Wong. Leanne, Anthony and Bob provided daily professional support to the membership from the ACAC office. Bill Hendsbee completed his first term in the office of Commissioner.

The ACAC Conference Council met on three occasions during the 2006-07 academic year. A two-day planning meeting was held at Percy Page Centre in Edmonton in September. A four-day strategic planning meeting was held at the Sutton Place Hotel in Edmonton in December. The AGM, consisting largely of a business meeting, was held over four days at the Banff Park Lodge, in Banff from April 30 – May 4th, 2007.

Once again, the Conference was able to achieve a high percentage of the objectives set out for itself in 2006-07 and re-oriented several of the major functions within the office.

FINANCES

ACAC Vice President (Finance), Bill Dean supervised the day to day transactions undertaken by Executive Director Bob Day. Together, these individuals capably managed the finances of the ACAC and provided updated information to the membership to enable the Conference to assess the financial status of the ACAC in a more well-informed fashion. An external review of the ACAC's 2004-05 financial records was undertaken and completed by the accounting firm of Peterson Walker in the early fall of 2005. Peterson Walker will be contracted to perform a review of the ACAC's 2006-07 financial records in the late summer of 2007. A significant change in the management of the ACAC's financial accounting records took place in 1996-97 with the employment of Elvi Clark as the ACAC's off-site office accounting consultant. On a

monthly basis, Ms. Clark reviews all financial transactions into a Simply Accounting program and produces the monthly and year-end financial reports.

The ASRPW Foundation provided the ACAC with a grant of \$142,000.00 for the 2006-07 year. This grant is extremely important in helping to reduce ACAC expenses to the individual colleges.

At year-end, the ACAC's overall financial situation resulted in a modest operating surplus intended to augment the Conference reserve which had fallen substantively during the years 2000 to 2003. The goal of the Conference is to establish a financial stabilization fund amounting to two years of ASRPWF grant monies, or \$250,000, with the condition that the funds may only be accessed with Council approval. The intent of the fund is to provide the Conference with a two year period of stable funding should the ASRPWF grant be withdrawn. All operating surpluses are invested into low risk investments which provide protection for the ACAC in the event of any future catastrophic financial crisis.

The significant financial review completed during 2002-3 was intended to avoid future deficits after three consecutive years of deficit budgeting. Notwithstanding these deficits, the Conference presented net assets approximating \$246,000 at year end, compared to \$206,000 the previous year! Net assets climbed to \$246,000 at the end of 2005. Subsequent to this review, the Conference is now committed to realizing modest surpluses annually until the reserve target amount is realized. This shall be managed by presenting conservative budgets which shall be balanced through the adjustment of membership fees. At the same time, the Conference remains committed in its search for possible marketing revenues. The Conference Council elected to implement a three year advance budgeting process in order to attempt to strategically plan for upcoming fiscal changes. This process continues in view of increasing inflationary challenges.

PARTICIPATION AND COMPETITION RESULTS

In 2006-07, a total of 1,775 male and female athletes competed in thirteen sanctioned league or tournament sports. A breakdown of participation by sport, gender and institution can be examined in Table 3 of Appendix II. Final college placements in all activities are located in Table 4 of Appendix II.

Once again, ACAC teams were considered amongst the finest in Canada. For complete CCAA Championship results, see Table 11 of Appendix II.

INDIVIDUAL HONOURS AND AWARDS

Fifteen ACAC athletes were distinguished as CCAA All-Canadians in their respective sports for the 2006-07 season (see Table 12 Appendix II). In addition, 34 athletes were named CCAA Academic All-Canadians, an award which recognizes those student-athletes who combine athletic and academic excellence (see Table 16 of Appendix II). ACAC athletes truly symbolize the ACAC motto of *"Combining Athletic and Academic Achievement"*.

Other CCAA awards featured in this publication include ACAC athletes chosen as tournament all-stars at the CCAA National Championships (Table 13) and the CCAA Athletes of the Month (Table 14) selected from the ACAC. The CCAA named two ACAC coaches for "Coaches of the Year" (Table 12).

Tables 4 through 8 list the recipients of individual ACAC Awards in 2006-07. These tables include the 176 All-Conference Award recipients (Table 6), twelve ACAC Coaches of the Year (Table 7) and 270 ACAC Academic Athletic Award recipients (Table 8).

FINANCIAL AID TO ATHLETES

Financial aid received by ACAC athletes through the Jimmie Condon Scholarship program administered by the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund totaled over \$1.7 million for the 2006-07 activity year. A complete scholarship breakdown by sport and institution is located in Table 17 of Appendix II.

The ACAC would like to acknowledge the significant financial support provided by the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund through the Jimmie Condon Scholarship program.

A SUMMARY OF KEY ACAC DEVELOPMENTS IN 2006-07

- The Conference welcomed one new employee in the fall of 2006. Leanne Dickau joined the staff as Executive Assistant in September 2006 as Erin Cameron went on maternity leave.
- One ACAC member institution hosted a CCAA National Championships in 2006-07 as MacEwan College was host of the 2006 CCAA Women's Basketball Championships.
- The financial foundation of the Conference was assured once again by the Alberta Sport, Recreation Parks & Wildlife Foundation by their contribution of a grant in the amount of \$142,000 for the administration of college sport in Alberta.
- **Subway** concluded a seventh year of a generous program of support for ACAC athletics. The program included the sponsorship of Athlete of the Week awards (6' party subs), two \$1,000 ACAC Player of the Year Scholarships and \$1,000 cash subsidies to each member college.
- **adidas, Sher-Wood Hockey and Elite Sportswear** of Edmonton continued to support the Conference through "in kind" sponsorship and in the case of the latter two, \$500 scholarships for our top hockey and basketball players. Adidas assumed the title sponsorship of the ACAC Soccer Championships.
- **Konica Minolta** remained as an ACAC sponsor, providing two plain paper fax machines for use at the ACAC office and the Commissioner's office, a photocopy machine for the ACAC office and scholarships for our top volleyball players.

- **eurosport** became the new presenting sponsor of the ACAC Women's and Men's Soccer Championship Player of the Game awards and provided two, \$500 scholarships for the top two soccer players.
- **ATB Financial** became the new presenting sponsor of all ACAC Conference Championships with a support of \$25,000 for the 2007-08 season.
- The Conference finished the last year of its two year agreement with 10 hotel properties and bid letters were sent out to acquire new host hotels for the next two seasons. At the May AGM Council voted on and affirmed the host hotels for the 2007-09 seasons.
- In January 2006 the ACAC launched a new look to the website giving it a fresh new design to help promote the ACAC and provide better information about the Conference.
- The ACAC Outlook Newsletter, previously distributed three times a year, became a monthly electronic newsletter that was sent out to members in the Conference as well as high schools in Alberta and Saskatchewan.

President's Report

Dr. Ellery Pullman, Briercrest College

It is my pleasure to bring you a brief report of the activities and accomplishments attained during this past season of ACAC athletics. At the outset I want to express my sincere thanks to the Executive Committee and the Council as a whole for your wholehearted support and encouragement during this my first year as President of the ACAC.

This was another busy year for the ACAC on several fronts. For example; we reviewed various aspects of our organizational "best practices", new initiatives were launched, and new accomplishments were also gained.

A year ago the new Executive Committee felt there was a need to revisit our governance, vision, values and missional perspectives as they related to our conference operations. We spent time in December during our planning days, as well as in May at our AGM looking at our core values, processes of communication, succession planning as well as taking time to glance into our preferred future as an organization. I appreciated the contributions of everyone to that discussion. At the same time we know that the benefits of those discussions will only be as good as the commitments we make to living out our core values individually and corporately, as we continue to function together to make the ACAC the best it can be.

This past year also saw some new faces join our conference while at the same time saying good bye to some esteemed colleagues. Leanne Dickau joined us last summer as our administrative assistant, filling in admirably during Erin Cameron's maternity leave. As Leanne leaves us, I want to say thanks for a job well done. Bill Hendsbee came on board as our conference Commissioner and did an outstanding job in his first year in that role. I want to say a special thanks to Bob Day for his commitment to helping orient both Leanne and Bill to their new tasks.

We also said goodbye to several individuals who have been steadfast contributors and supporters of the ACAC for many years. Al Ferchuk and Tim Tollestrup were our first inductees into our "Founders Club" for their outstanding contributions to the ACAC. We also recognized Yvonne Becker for her excellent leadership and many years of service to the ACAC. Each of these individual's have left their mark of excellence on the ACAC; their day to day contributions will be missed as their legacy lives on. We also said goodbye to Claire Patterson who resigned from Kings College and University to move to BC.

A number of new initiatives were implemented this past year as well. If I began to mention the individuals who were involved with these ventures I would be fearful of missing someone – so my personal thanks to each of you. Several of these new developments were as follows:

- The lifting of our membership moratorium which resulted in a new membership application / review process;
- The introduction of the electronic newsletter. The responses to this have been excellent;
- The introduction of additional ConfLink archival developments;
- The establishment of a conference wide scheduling committee;
- The successful implementation of a new competitive format for volleyball;
- Significant enhancement of the Subway agreement;
- The attainment of ATB Financial Services as a major sponsor of the ACAC;

- The successful hosting of the women's basketball nationals at MacEwan College. Congratulations to MacEwan for a job well done!

In June I had the opportunity of attending my first CCAA AGM in Victoria. If you have not already done so, I would encourage you to go to the CCAA website for updates related to the various aspects of business that were dealt with during the AGM. One of the things that impressed me the most was the extent to which many of our ACAC colleagues are involved with the CCAA. Although mindful of their involvement, it was exciting to hear how highly regarded Bill Dean, Leigh Goldie, Al Ferchuk, Yvonne Becker, Greg Meroupoulis, and Bob Day are for their contributions to the CCAA.

Also during the CCAA AGM special recognition was paid to the following individuals and institutions: Al Ferchuk for his leadership and many years of service at the national level; Francois Fournier of GPRC was recognized as the CCAA Athletic Director of the Year; Ken Babey was on hand representing SAIT who was honored with the CCAA Community Service Award; Yvonne Becker was also recognized for her outstanding contribution to the Female Apprentice Coaching Program; Greg Meroupulis was recognized for his contributions as the men's basketball convenor for the past two years; as well Leigh Goldie is highly regarded as the men's volleyball convenor. Each of these individuals have represented the ACAC with distinction and honor. I also want to thank Wade Kolmel for his diligent service and work as our CCAA representative. Wade did an excellent job in representing the ACAC's position as it related to the many issues under discussions.

As we move into the summer months I trust each of you will have moments of reflection and times of relaxation and renewal. However, in your moments of reflection let me also leave you with a bit of a challenge. We know that any future success we experience as an athletic conference will only come as we are committed to working together to make good things happen.

Management expert, Peter Drucker has said that, "there is no success without a successor." To that end, as we think about the kind of athletic conference we have today, the athletes we are working with, the people that we influence in our places of work, let me encourage you think about four aspects of leadership as characterized by author John Maxwell who points out that these characteristics will also go a long way in defining our future; both personally and professionally; and which I believe will also impact our athletic conference.

Character – Being and becoming a moral example. The two words most commonly linked to character are integrity and honesty. Integrity involves being true to oneself, while honesty means being truthful with others.

Choices – Thinking clearly and making wise decisions. Careful decision-making requires a sense of right and wrong rooted in character. To make the right decisions consistently, we can't let external influence or peer pressure cause us to do something wrong when our internal conscience is telling us to do what is right. To violate conscience undermines our self-respect and shatters not only our moral authority, but our confidence as leaders. Successful people make important decisions early in their life, then manage those decisions the rest of their lives.

Conduct – Doing the right things consistently well. Conduct is defined as "a mode of personal behavior." Only individuals can behave. The conduct of an organization, sports team, or any agency for that matter is a reflection of the conduct of the individuals making up the organization.

To shape the conduct of the individuals who follow us, we must be able to hold them accountable for their behavior. But first, we must be held accountable ourselves. Author Chuck Swindoll says accountability is “a willingness to explain your actions.” If our actions are indefensible, we’ll be stripped of the real authority to exercise moral leadership.

As leaders, we set the tone for the conduct of the individuals in our organization. People do what people see. Conduct is learned through observation. As Dr. Michael Guido says, “The world pays more attention to your conduct than it does to your creed.” As leaders, we teach what we know, but we reproduce who we are.

Consequences – Receiving the results of seeds that we sow. The success of any day we enjoy is based on the seeds that we sow, not the harvest we reap. Too often, leaders bypass the process of sowing seeds in favor of shortcuts for immediate results. Sadly, the end begins to justify the means, and principles are tossed out for more expedient behavior.

Successful leaders who submit themselves to the process of sowing the right seeds will meet with tremendous rewards—whether we see the fruits firsthand or not. Here are five reasons for keeping your attention on sowing well rather than seeing instant results:

- (1) The seeds we sow will determine the harvest we reap.
- (2) There is no reaping unless we have been sowing.
- (3) Sowers are committed to giving before receiving.
- (4) Sowers enjoy giving more than receiving.
- (5) Sowing daily into the lives of others will compound over time.

We spend our day either preparing or repairing. Preparing allows us to focus on today, while repairing forces us to clean up yesterday. Preparing invests for the future, repairing pays down past debts. Preparing increases efficiency, but repairing consumes precious time. Preparing increases confidence, while repairing breeds discouragement. Remember: the secret of your success is determined by your daily agenda.

As noted earlier, I am very appreciative of each of you that make up the leadership team of the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference. I trust that as we remain committed to both academic and athletic excellence for our athletes that they will see in each of us an example of what we hope they will become as a result of being involved in ACAC athletics.

Executive Director's Report Dr. Robert Day

It is my pleasure to submit my report covering the 2006-07 year. I am very pleased to have again been of service to you, my colleagues, and the Conference during the past twelve months. My goal continues to be to engage Council in continual strategic planning and then engage our office staff in supporting the strategic planning process.

Again this past year, the evaluation year was not without its extraordinary challenges. Personally, my health took another blow following my Nov. 28 knee replacement surgery when I was hospitalized for an additional eight days subsequent to "throwing" a substantive blood clot in my lung, timing which necessitated missing the December Planning Meetings. Poor recovery from the knee surgery has resulted in intensive, thrice weekly physical therapy since Christmas (revised just this week to twice weekly). For the most part however, I have been able to adjust working hours so that the job was compromised little during the past three months.

Both I, and the Conference were extremely fortunate that we were able to replace Erin Cameron with Leanne Dickau. Not unlike previous years, Erin's departure September 15 was at perhaps the worst time possible and presented special challenges for the Office staff and for Leanne in particular. Adding to the challenge was that Erin did not return to the Office for a day to orient Leanne as anticipated and the fact that several tasks normally completed remained undone. I am particularly thankful for Leanne's dedicated efforts and patience she exhibited as she was engaged immediately in busy, time-sensitive work. I am thankful too for the patience and co-operation extended Leanne by our membership! At the same time, the presence of Technical Assistant Anthony Wong ameliorated somewhat what could have been an extremely stressful time. Leanne did an excellent job for us and the Office didn't miss a beat!

We were unsuccessful in securing a U of A placement student for the Office during the fall, 2006 semester. However, it would have not been possible to supervise a student while at the same time managing the general business of the Office and orienting a new Executive Assistant. Neither would this assistance have aided Leanne and Anthony. I am, however, pleased to report that we have applied to again secure a STEP grant for this summer and have also made application to a new Federal summer jobs program, for which we hope to secure a 16 week placement. The intent of the position is to complete the motions archive for coaches meetings and develop a reference for Commissioner rulings as distinct from the examples included in the Commissioner's Casebook.

Generally speaking, we are very pleased with what we have been able to accomplish during the past year. Significant time was spent with the orientation of a new Commissioner and I believe Bill Hendsbee served the Conference well. The investiture of a new President too afforded opportunity for a review of procedures as Dr. Pullman was oriented throughout the year.

The Executive Committee met on seven occasions during the past year, four meetings of which were completed via conference call. The Committee dealt with both housekeeping matters and items of particular note which were presented to them throughout the year.

Much time is spent on Conference budgeting. With the assistance of VP, Finance Bill Dean I continued provision of responsible budgeting and the provision of comprehensive, easy to read budget summaries. Cheques are produced twice monthly. In addition, I continue to oversee the provision of a focused plan to build a Conference Reserve. I wish to express my thanks to Bill for his assistance as he intends to leave the portfolio at the end of this current term of office.

Marketing initiatives continue under the auspices of the Conference Marketing Committee. Those agreements currently in place, including Subway, Sher-Wood, adidas, Elite and Konica Minolta, have been serviced during the year. Kicks was replaced with *eurosport* as one of our two principal soccer sponsors. I am pleased that I was able to continue our Player of the Year scholarship program. The Sher-Wood Hockey four year agreement enters the final year of the contract and I am currently seeking feedback on renewal from our hockey members. Each of the other contracts are renewed annually.

In the fall, we submitted an extensive and well-received annual report to the ASRPWF. The Foundation has experienced personnel changes over the past 18 months and we have seen our liaison changed from Roger Kramers to Marvin Dobish to Glen Cowper.

I am pleased I have been able to further develop improved communication and relations with our officials associations, particularly basketball and volleyball. We have minimal contact with the Alberta Soccer Association but this is more representative of a state of good relations than neglect.

One new, interesting development over the year was the lifting of the membership moratorium and the implementation of the ad hoc membership committees. It was a pleasure to work closely with Allan Ferchuk and Wade Kolmel as we reviewed the applications from Portage College (men's hockey) and Medicine Hat College (golf). In retrospect, it was advantageous we received application only for the introduction of new sports from current members as this enabled us to implement the review process in a considered fashion with members with whom we had existing relationships. The guidelines developed by Council worked well for the most part. Throughout the process we gained an appreciation for priorities which I will be able to convey to future committees. You have received our recommendation which details in part our work.

In December, the Council elected to invest in the Scheduling Committee the responsibility for developing the gymnasium schedule. As you are aware, the introduction of the volleyball divisional format necessitated moving the scheduling task from October, when schedules had been developed previously, to late February following the conclusion of the volleyball championships.

Prior to the AGM I shall enjoy a professional development experience when I attend the ASRPWF Leadership Summit in Banff April 12-14. While my attendance at the Summit is somewhat expected, owing to our funding relationship with the Foundation, I will have the opportunity to attend presentations on revenue generation, sport and law, insurance, contracts and non-profit effectiveness.

I have continued to attempt to enhance the Office profile by attending numerous ACAC events during the year including numerous regular season matches, the ACAC soccer championships, the swimming championships, the women's volleyball championships, men's basketball championships, the CCAA Women's Basketball Championships, women's hockey play-offs and men's hockey play-offs. I have represented the Conference in medal presentations in soccer,

swimming, women's volleyball, men's basketball, women's hockey and men's hockey. Next year, I intend to visit the badminton championships, cross-country running championships, curling and golf championships as well as the CCAA Cross-Country Running Championships at Grande Prairie and the CCAA Women's Volleyball Championships at Mount Royal College.

It has been a pleasure this season to attend matches and events at Concordia, MacEwan, Mount Royal, NAIT, Portage, Red Deer, SAIT and King's. In particular, I was pleased to visit Portage College for the first time in February for the membership site visit. Also of note was my attendance at the Red Deer College Awards night April 4 where I had the pleasure of witnessing a parting tribute to Allan Ferchuk! Next season I have scheduled a trip to Keyano for the first time and hope to attend events at Briercrest College and Grande Prairie Regional College as well, attending both for the first time since my five year tenure began.

The 2006-7 season will be remembered as a signal one as we bid fond farewells to two of our most distinguished members. It is with regret that we mark the retirements of Allan Ferchuk of Red Deer College and Tim Tollestrup of Lethbridge Community College. These two men have served as pillars of the Conference for many years offering both sage advice and strong commitments through their many years on the Conference Council and Executive Committee. It has been my pleasure personally to work closely with them and I can assure you they will be sorely missed! Thank you to both for assisting me in my task over the past five years in the Office and the past dozen years I have been associated with the Conference.

The effect of these retirements and the normal conclusion of Executive terms of office present both a particular challenge and an opportunity to the Conference. Over the last couple years, and continuing this summer, the conference will be invested with much "new blood". I anticipate the portrait of the 2007-8 Executive Committee will present a committed group largely new to Conference operations. While this will represent a signal challenge for them and for the Council, I see it too as an opportunity for those of us who have been around the Conference table to some years to enable them fully by providing a supportive network behind them.

This will continue as we further address our Conference strategic planning at this AGM. To this end, I will seek to offer my experience in encouraging the development of organizational policies stemming from these deliberations with the intent of enabling our staff to effect consistent and effective operational policies. In doing so, we will focus on establishing and maintaining a positive and effective relationship between our staff and you, our volunteers.

In closing, I am pleased to offer special thanks to the Executive Committee for assisting us with so many important tasks during the course of the year. I wish to extend particular thanks to President Ellery Pullman, with whom I am in regular communication. Thanks too to you, our members who work to make the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference the pre-eminent conference in Canada. Thank you.

Commissioner's Report Bill Hendsbee

As you are aware, this was my first season as Commissioner. I have spent the better part of this year "learning the ropes." While I am now comfortable in the position, one of the challenges at the end of the year is identifying trends from previous years. The process of identifying trends will become easier as I continue in the position and I expect to be able to comment on those trends in further detail in subsequent years.

My report of November 20, 2006 is attached for your reference. That report dealt with the significant issues that arose during the first half of the year, including a year end report on soccer.

During the 2006 soccer season the most significant issue dealt with the proper registration of athletes using the ACAC ConLink system and as a result of registration errors three schools forfeited games. The ACAC Appeals Committee upheld the Commissioner's ruling that the Operating Code does not distinguish between "procedural ineligibility" and "substantive ineligibility." With this issue now clarified, I am hopeful that it will not arise as a problem during the 2007-08 season.

Soccer discipline statistics from 2006 were consistent with the 2005 season. In fact, yellow and red cards for both men and women were virtually identical between the two seasons.

The most significant issue for men's and women's basketball was a mid-season change to the accumulation rule for technical fouls. It was determined that this rule does not apply to coaches. Of note, although I have not yet had the chance to examine the statistics, it was my impression that the number of technicals assessed to coaches increased in frequency following the rule change. I will attempt to obtain those statistics for presentation at the AGM.

Statistically, the number of technical fouls assessed during 2006-07 was virtually identical to the number assessed during the 2005-06 season.

Men's hockey also had its own mid-season rule clarification, which is also attached for your review. As I indicated in that rule interpretation, the wording of the Operating Code sections dealing with fighting must be reviewed and revised to reflect the intention of the hockey coaches. The ruling clarified that no suspensions would be issued for fighting regardless of when the fight took place and regardless of whether an instigator penalty was assessed. It should be noted that game misconducts in men's hockey nearly doubled from 2005-06 with 120 game misconducts assessed in 2006-07, up from 62 the previous year.

One trend that I feel bears closer scrutiny in the future is the relationship between game officials and ACAC players and team officials. In dealing with disciplinary cases relating to the abuse of game officials, I have been advised by athletic directors and coaches that they have concerns with the training and competency of officials. Clearly, abuse of game officials cannot be condoned on that basis. Those concerns should be dealt with through appropriate channels. I do not have statistics from past years to refer to. However, incidents of abuse of game officials by both players and coaches were numerous during 2006-07. This is an issue I intend to monitor on an ongoing basis. In the interim, I encourage each school to continue fostering an attitude of respect towards ACAC officials.

All in all, it has been a successful year. I enjoyed getting to know numerous athletic directors and coaches and I look forward to building on those relationships during the coming year.
