INTRODUCTION

2008-09 marked the ACAC's 44th year of service in the provision of competitive post - secondary sport opportunities for Alberta's ever expanding college student population. From its humble beginnings in 1964, when five member institutions fielded men's basketball teams in the former Western Inter-College Conference, the ACAC boasted seventeen member institutions in 2008-09. College athletes competed in thirteen athletic activities. The number of annual ACAC participants has correspondingly increased from approximately 50 in 1964-65 to 1,734 in 2008-09. During the course of its existence, the ACAC has positively impacted the lives of over 32,000 individuals by fostering a climate of growth, development and education through competitive sport. Ultimately, many of these ACAC graduates became valuable leaders in the framework of Alberta sport.

By virtue of the fact that ACAC teams and individuals have won more medals than any other provincial college athletic conference in Canadian College Athletics Association (CCAA) national championship competitions, the ACAC is widely regarded as the pre-eminent college athletic conference in Canada. Moreover, over the course of the past year, the Conference has intentionally addressed this goal in review with an eye to maintaining that pre-eminent position into the future! Alberta's post-secondary student athletes are fortunate to have the opportunity to pursue their academic and athletic aspirations at the finest collection of post secondary institutions assembled in any Canadian province.

The Conference is thankful for the support offered by many "partners", most notably the Alberta Sport, Recreation, Parks and Wildlife Foundation and the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund, Alberta Government departments who support financially a large measure of our Conference operations through operational grants and scholarships.

This annual report chronicles the activities and results of the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference during the period of July 1, 2008 through to June 30, 2009. Key developments and activities are described in the "2008-09 in Review" section which follows this introduction and in the Executive Reports found in Appendix I. Appendix II contains the statistical story of 2008-09.

 MEMBERSHIP

The number of participating institutions in the ACAC grew to sixteen in 1996-97 with the admission of Briercrest Bible College and The King's University College into the Conference. Briercrest Bible College, located in Caronport, Saskatchewan, was granted "guest playing privileges" and became the first non-Alberta institution to compete in the ACAC. BBC Clipper teams competed in the ACAC's South Division men's and women's basketball and volleyball. The College amended its name to Briercrest College (BC) in 2005. The King's University College, in Edmonton, joined the ACAC's North Division, competing in men's and women's basketball only in 1996-97. In 1997-98, both colleges increased their participation with BBC joining men's hockey and TKUC joining men's and women's volleyball in the North Division. Grant MacEwan Community College also joined men's hockey for the 1997-98 season; Concordia University College of Alberta joined women's and men's basketball in 1999-00 and Portage College joined men's and women's volleyball in 2001-02. Olds College rejoined the ACAC as a guest member in 2001-02 in sports of golf and curling after a seven year absence. The University of Calgary joined in 2002-03 as a guest member in golf and women's hockey while The King's University College and Keyano College joined competition in soccer. Lakeland College joined ACAC competition in basketball in 2003-04. Finally, Grande Prairie Regional College joined the Conference soccer ranks in 2004-5.

The seventeen institutions who participated in the 2008-09 regular season included fifteen private and/or public colleges and two technical institutes. Three institutions were officially designated as university colleges and are among eleven ACAC institutions which have full degree granting status. Furthermore, fourteen institutions were categorized as "full" members of the Conference, one was classified as an "associate" member and two were "guest" members. The number of activities into which an institution chooses to enter determines membership status. The primary advantage to institutions competing in a greater number of activities, and thus holding full membership status, is the privilege of appointing two voting delegates to the Conference Council, the association's main decision-making body. Associate members are accorded only one voting delegate whereas guest members or institutions that enjoy guest playing privileges are entitled to have speaking privileges but no vote at Conference Council meetings. Associate member Prairie Bible College announced their withdrawal from the Conference prior to the 2005 AGM.

Historically, new inquiries about membership were received in 1996-97 from Flathead Community College in Montana and the College of the Rockies in Cranbrook, B.C. Both of these colleges were informed that the ACAC Conference Council had placed a three-year moratorium (ended in June 2000) on new membership in order to allow the Conference to sufficiently adjust to its most recent expansion. In 1998-99, the ACAC office received new inquiries from Fairview College and Olds College (Olds College is a former member of the ACAC). During the 1999-00 term, St. Mary's College in Calgary and Northwest Bible College in Edmonton inquired about future membership. In 2000-01, Fairview College and Northwest Bible College, again, showed interest but did not

make application to join. Subsequently, new inquiries were received from Northern Lakes College (Slave Lake), Muskawchees Cultural College (Hobbema), as well as the three Alberta Universities (U of A, U of C and U of L). Olds College made a formal application and joined the ACAC as a guest member for 2001-02 in the sports of golf and curling.

During the past four years, membership enquiries were received from St. Mary's College in Calgary and Taylor University (formerly North American Baptist College) in Edmonton. The moratorium on participation was lifted at the May 2006 AGM and new applications were accepted in fall 2006. At the May 2009 AGM, Council approved the addition of five college sport applications: Keyano Basketball (2010-11), Augustana Volleyball (2010-11), Lakeland Soccer (2010-11), MacEwan Golf (2009-10) and Lakeland Cross Country Running (2010-11).

ADMINISTRATION

The governance and management of the ACAC was efficiently undertaken during the 2008-09 season by an ACAC Executive Committee which included President Wade Kolmel (Keyano), Vice President, Operations Alan Rogan (Lakeland), Vice President, Finance Leigh Goldie (GPRC), Vice President, Marketing Kelly Almer (Medicine Hat College) and Past-President Dr. Ellery Pullman (Briercrest). This Committee met on eight occasions between July 1, 2008 and June 30, 2009. Office staff included Executive Director Dr. Robert D. Day, Executive Assistant Elaine Crawford, Technical Assistant Anthony Wong and Laurie de Grace, Marketing and Communications Coordinator. Elaine, Laurie, Anthony and Bob provided daily professional support to the membership from the ACAC Office. Bill Hendsbee completed his third term in the office of ACAC Commissioner.

The ACAC Conference Council met on three occasions during the 2008-09 academic year. A two-day planning meeting was held at the Conference host hotel, the Best Western Village Park Inn in Calgary in September. A three-day strategic planning meeting was held at the Sutton Place Hotel in Edmonton in December. The AGM, consisting largely of a business meeting, was held over four days at Grande Prairie Regional College, in Grande Prairie from May 4th – 7th 2009.

Once again, the Conference was able to achieve a high percentage of the objectives set out for itself in 2008-09 and re-oriented several of the major functions within the office.

FINANCES

ACAC Vice President, Finance Leigh Goldie supervised the day to day transactions undertaken by Executive Director Bob Day. Together, these individuals capably managed the finances of the ACAC and provided updated information to the membership to enable the Conference to assess the financial status of the ACAC in a more well-informed fashion. An external review of the ACAC's 2007-08 financial records was undertaken and completed by the accounting firm of Peterson Walker in the summer of 2008. Peterson Walker will be contracted to perform a review of the ACAC's 2008-09 financial records in the late summer of 2009. A significant change in the management of the ACAC's financial accounting records took place in 1996-97 with the

employment of Elvi Clark as the ACAC's off-site office accounting consultant. On a monthly basis, Ms. Clark reviews all financial transactions into a Simply Accounting program and produces the monthly and year-end financial reports.

The Alberta Sport, Recreation, Parks and Wildlife Foundation provided the ACAC with a grant of \$163,300.00 for the 2008-09 year. As noted above, this grant is extremely important in helping to reduce ACAC assessments to the individual colleges.

At year-end, the ACAC's overall financial situation resulted in a modest operating surplus intended to augment the Conference reserve which had fallen substantively during the years 2000 to 2003. The goal of the Conference is to establish a financial stabilization fund amounting to two years of ASRPWF grant monies, or \$326,600, with the condition that the funds may only be accessed with Council approval. The intent of the fund is to provide the Conference with a two year period of stable funding should the ASRPWF grant be withdrawn. All operating surpluses are invested into low risk investments which provide protection for the ACAC in the event of any future catastrophic financial crisis.

The significant financial review completed during 2002-3 was intended to avoid future deficits after three consecutive years of deficit budgeting. Notwithstanding these deficits, the Conference presented net assets approximating \$ 353,000 at year end, compared to \$246,000 the previous year! Subsequent to this review, the Conference is now committed to realizing modest surpluses annually until the reserve target amount is realized. This shall be managed by presenting conservative budgets which shall be balanced through the adjustment of membership fees. At the same time, the Conference remains committed in its search for possible marketing revenues, now. The Conference Council elected to implement a three year advance budgeting process in order to attempt to strategically plan for upcoming fiscal changes. This process continues in view of increasing inflationary challenges.

PARTICIPATION AND COMPETITION RESULTS

In 2008-09, a total of 1,734 male and female athletes competed in twelve sanctioned league or tournament sports. A breakdown of participation by sport, gender and institution can be examined in Table 3 of Appendix II. Final college placements in all activities are located in Table 4 of Appendix II.

Once again, ACAC teams were considered amongst the finest in Canada. For complete CCAA Championship results, see Table 11 of Appendix II.

INDIVIDUAL HONOURS AND AWARDS

Sixteen ACAC athletes were distinguished as CCAA All-Canadians in their respective sports for the 2008-09 season (see Table 12 Appendix II). In addition, 34 athletes were named CCAA Academic All-Canadians, an award which recognizes those student-athletes who combine athletic and academic excellence (see Table 16 of Appendix II). ACAC athletes truly symbolize the ACAC motto of *"Building Character Through Athletic and Academic Achievement"*.

Other CCAA awards featured in this publication include ACAC athletes chosen as tournament all-stars at the CCAA National Championships (Table 13) and the CCAA Athletes of the Month (Table 14) selected from the ACAC.

Tables 4 through 8 list the recipients of individual ACAC Awards in 2008-09. These tables include the 2 ACAC Athletes of the Year (Table 5), the 18 ACAC Players of the Year (Table 6), the 182 All-Conference Award recipients (Table 7), the 19 ACAC Coaches of the Year (Table 8) and the 296 ACAC Academic Athletic Award recipients (Table 9).

FINANCIAL AID TO ATHLETES

Financial aid received by ACAC athletes through the Jimmie Condon Scholarship program administered by the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund totaled over \$1.9 million for the 2008-09 activity year. A complete scholarship breakdown by sport and institution is located in Table 17 of Appendix II.

The ACAC would like to acknowledge the significant financial support provided by the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund through the Jimmie Condon Scholarship program.

A SUMMARY OF KEY ACAC DEVELOPMENTS IN 2008-09

- One ACAC member institutions hosted CCAA National Championships in 2008-09 as Keyano College was host of the 2008-9 CCAA Men's Volleyball Championships in March.
- The financial foundation of the Conference was assured once again by the Alberta Sport, Recreation Parks & Wildlife Foundation by their contribution of a grant in the amount of \$163,300 for the administration of college sport in Alberta.
- The Conference introduced an exciting sponsorship program with the introduction of the ACAC Championships Partners Program (CPP). The CPP was highlighted by the partnership with **ATB Financial** who became involved as the Program's inaugural Presenting Partner.
- **Subway** concluded an ninth year of a generous program of support for ACAC athletics. The program included the sponsorship of Athlete of the Week awards (6' party subs), two \$1,000 ACAC Player of the Year Scholarships and \$2,000 cash subsidies to each member college.
- **adidas, Sher-Wood Hockey and Elite Sportswear** of Edmonton continued to support the Conference through "in kind" sponsorship and in the case of the latter two, \$500 scholarships for our top hockey and basketball players. **adidas** assumed the title sponsorship of the ACAC Soccer Championships.
- **Konica Minolta** remained as an ACAC sponsor, providing two plain paper fax machines for use at the ACAC office and the Commissioner's office, a photocopy

machine for the ACAC office and two, \$500 scholarships for our top volleyball players.

- The Conference introduced new two year agreements with 10 hotel properties as host hotels for the next two seasons.
- In December, 2007 launched an internal governance review resulting in the formation of a Task Force mandated to review how the Conference governs itself with an eye to (1) becoming more administratively efficient and (2) preparing a portal for the future growth and development of the Conference into the 21st Century.
- The ACAC Outlook Newsletter, previously distributed three times a year, continued as a monthly electronic newsletter that was sent out to members in the Conference as well as high schools in Alberta and Saskatchewan.
- At the May 2009 AGM, Council approved the addition of five college sport applications: Keyano Basketball (2010-11), Augustana Volleyball (2010-11), Lakeland Soccer (2010-11), MacEwan Golf (2009-10) and Lakeland Cross Country Running (2010-11).

President's Report

Executive Director's Report

Dr. Robert Day

The ACAC has completed its 42nd year of competition with several new faces around the Conference Council table and has rendered exceptional competition and some fine results at the CCAA national championships. Congratulations to our medalists and to all those who have achieved academic laurels. Congratulations too to Keyano College for their fine hosting of the CCAA National Men's Volleyball Championships! 2009-10 will be particularly noteworthy as the Conference will host no fewer than four CCAA National Championships – Cross-Country Running at Augustana, Badminton at NAIT, Men's Basketball at SAIT Polytechnic and Men's Volleyball at MacEwan!

The year was again marked by significant issues in a number of areas including use of improperly registered, but otherwise eligible athletes, concerns regarding inappropriate coach behaviour, evidence of questionable recruiting practices and once again, the need to orient and train new staff in the ACAC Office. Noteworthy was the fact the Conference received four new sport applications, all of which have received positive recommendations from their respective evaluation committees, as well as one which is pending which may also be reviewed favourably. Unfortunately however, the UofC Dinos' women's hockey team will no longer participate in the Conference, a fact announced last May. Also noteworthy was the introduction of Jimmie Condon Scholarships for cross-country running during the season, announced in December and retroactive to the fall semester despite the dull economic forecasts.

During 2008-9 too, the workload of the Commissioner, Bill Hendsbee, was significant and may even have eclipsed the amount of work during the record setting 2007-8 season. Should Council approve those Workbook motions requesting immediate notice of warnings and sanctions, the Conference may well need to make a greater financial investment in this area.

Significant too this year was the approval of the introduction of the new Policy Governance Model recommended by the Governance Task Force and approved by Council in December. While many questions remain unanswered, it is with a certain degree of anticipation we look forward to implementing the model over the next year and engaging our membership in the leadership of the Conference both on the Executive and in committee work so as to contribute to the stewardship of the Conference!

Your Executive Committee served the Conference well during the year and while we look forward with anticipation to the introduction of the revised Executive slate, we bid adieu with gratitude to Executive Committee members Leigh Goldie and Ellery Pullman. Their leadership has been appreciated.

There have been a number of other significant things that have occurred to date this year:

Sport Applications: You have received under separate cover a PDF document including positive recommendations on four new applications received last fall, a pending recommendation on the KC basketball recommendation denied last spring and two intermediary sport program reviews. While the review of these has made for a busy semester, we are encouraged by the development of the Conference. Thank you's to those members who served on the various evaluation committees.

Governance Task Force: For the most part, the Governance Task Force has completed its work. Since Council approved the recommendation in December, B. Dean has prepared documents relating to the "ACAC Decision Making Process", "Process and Timelines for Committee Work" and has produced a

“Proposed Policy Manual for the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference”. You will receive these documents for your review prior to the AGM and will have an opportunity to discuss these at that forum.

As you will have noted in the Workbook, the Conference is looking for all AD's and members of their respective college staffs to fill roles on both the revised Executive Committee and revised standing committees. As you have noted, each committee chairperson will now serve on the Executive Committee as more significant work will be vested in the committees which will then make recommendation, through the chairperson, to the Executive Committee where decision will be made. General Council will continue to be the final approval body although the intent of the Policy Governance Model is that all members will debate issues prior to them arriving at the Council table. As such, it is important to note that the Conference standing committees will become more significant working committees. Council members are encouraged to contact E. Pullman to state their preferred placement on the committee/Executive slates.

Championship Partners Program: While I was pleased to present the Conference with \$40,000 in CPP funding for the 2008-09 season (a total which resulted in lowered general assessments for our members) including the ATB sponsorship (\$25,000), the Subway sponsorship (\$10,000), the Sher-Wood sponsorship (\$5,000) and the Elite Sportswear sponsorship (\$2,500), I am not quite so positive about our prospects for 2009-10 owing to the downturn in the economy.

As you have heard, ATB is evaluating whether or not they realized increased business over the past two years of our partnership. Unfortunately, the survey recently distributed by the ACAC Office realized less than a 10% return. We will present ATB with our Report at month's end. Regarding Subway, as indicated to Council last September, they decreased their ACAC sponsorship by \$50,000 but allocated \$5,000 per college for local sponsorships. Unfortunately, only three ACAC members pursued these local partnerships and each received \$5,000. Preliminary indications suggest Subway may forego a Conference-wide CPP partnership in favour of local sponsorships in 2009-10.

Although I was excited about the introduction of the contract Marketing/Communications position, and excited about the candidate we found, I regret that the timing of the appointment coincided with this economic downturn and as a result, the results were not favourable. To date, the position has not realized even \$1 in new CPP or POY scholarship support and as a result, you will note in the attached budget the Executive Committee recommends the position not be renewed unless the outstanding ATRS grant application is approved (expected in late February but delayed owing to the integration of Capital Health into Alberta Health Services). At the present time, the Marketing/Communications position is contracted through June 30 and L. de Grace's efforts will be focused on renewing the ATB and Subway agreements and on finding new partners until that time.

This year's report on the CPP is much more discouraging than that provided last year. The results of this year's efforts beg the question whether or not the Conference should continue to be involved in sponsorships or whether this should be entirely the purview of our individual members. The Marketing Committee has addressed this internally on several occasions over the past two years. Opinions differ. The fifteen year history of Conference involvement in sponsorship has evidenced varied results. It may well be time for the Conference to address this issue although I caution the membership against assuming too pessimistic a view during these unusually severe economic times.

Fiscal Situation: The Conference continues to find itself in a solid fiscal position. VP Finance L. Goldie reported in December that operations were proceeding as planned. The Conference held a casino in November and realized \$80,989, well over the budgeted amount of \$65,000. This surplus, divided over two years, is intended to be transferred to the Conference Reserve Fund which sits currently at approximately \$245,000, 75% of the mandated \$326,600 (compared to \$226,209.05 or 69% at this time last year) the Council-mandated ASRPWF grant reserve to cover the Conference for a two year period in the event provincial government funding is withdrawn).

I have had occasion recently to discuss with Foundation representatives the implications of the announced 2009-10 Alberta Government budget deficit on ASRPWF programming, including our annual Association Programming Grant. We have been assured our 2009-10 grant amount will not be reduced although we will not receive assurances for 2010-11 for some time.

Members will note the proposed 2009-10 budget represents a \$4,000 increase in assessments for the membership. This is accounted for in decreases to the revenue side of the budget through the removal of \$35,000 in ATB/Subway CPP sponsorship (which has not been confirmed to this point in time) and the addition of approximately \$30,000 to expenses through the approved extension of the TA position to a twelve month position and the return of E. Cameron as EA. As it stands, the budget is frugal.

Jimmie Condon Scholarships: You are aware of the increase to Jimmie Condon program with the addition of cross-country running. When announced in December, I engaged in conversation with Alberta Scholarship's Stuart Dunn regarding the sport of curling and at the time, we had a verbal agreement to implement Jimmie Condon's for curling in December, 2009 and make the announcement with Kevin Martin and Minister Cindy Ady during the lead up to the "Roar of the Rings" Olympic Qualifying Event being held in Edmonton next December. All bets may be off now in view of the recently announced provincial deficit but I will again "quietly" engage Mr. Dunn in conversation on this in June. Please keep this on the "QT" til then.

Host Hotels: Within the PDF you will receive a spread sheet summarizing those properties which have chosen to bid in each member community. The response was very good. With rare exception, the process has been successful in securing very good rates with special bonuses such as breakfast and food discounts. Moreover, the contracts are expected to garner for the Conference \$6,250 in advertising support in each year of the contracts. The practice of using the host hotels for non-conference play as well in most of our communities, although not strictly required by the Conference, has resulted in better rates for our members while travelling.

ACAC Commissioner: Commissioner Bill Hendsbee has experienced another increase in ACAC-related business this year, that after a significant increase in workload in 2007-8. There has been an unusually high number of eligibility rulings and as you know, unfortunately several institutional sanctions relating to eligibility were imposed. Bill has done a fine job to date and has remained cognizant of Council's wishes that cases be disposed of in an expeditious fashion. He continues to do so in almost every case. You have received his report. Bill has indicated intends to return for another year subject to his evaluation.

CCAA AGM: Much of this event has been planned and you'll note a copy of the CCAA AGM Schedule has been included with the meeting attachments. L. de Grace has assumed responsibility for registration and final arrangements. ACAC AD's are invited to join us for the entire AGM. It serves as a good opportunity to both meet those representing the CCAA from across the country, meet the CCAA Office staff and to get a taste of how CCAA business is conducted. You have received a non-delegate registration package earlier. The Conference will be represented by A. Rogan, W. Kolmel and myself as voting delegates while B. Dean (CCAA President), M. Kosak (VP Marketing) and L. Goldie (MBB Convenor) will also be in attendance.

Meetings will be held at MacEwan College with the Sutton Place Hotel serving as AGM Central. Should you not be able to attend the entire event you may wish to drop into the hospitality room in the Royale Suite (Rm. 2401) at the Sutton Place Tuesday or Wednesday evening after 8 PM or join us at Snow Valley on Tuesday, June 9 at 1 PM for lunch and the team building session (led by L. Goldie) following. Thank you to those of you who have volunteered to assist us in staging the event!

ACAC Office Staffing: It's fair to say the revolving door staffing of the EA position in the ACAC Office is now the norm rather than the exception as we welcomed our fifth person in that position in the past five years. The arrival of Elaine Crawford, when combined with the addition of Marketing/Communications Director Laurie de Grace necessitated substantive time be spent in staff

training and orientation for A. Wong and myself. Clearly, there were wrinkles experienced in certain administrative areas during the year however one benefit of a new employee is that often we are reminded of the importance of completing tasks in a precise fashion. As you heard above, it is difficult to define clearly the reasons why the CPP program development has realized no successes. Again, I am particularly pleased with the job Anthony has done for the Conference. At this time we understand E. Cameron will return to the Office August 1 although she is not bound to inform us of her intentions until June 15. The August 1 starting date is intended to save the Conference one month's salary which is, in effect, being used to keep Anthony on during the summer months.

In addition, the ACAC Office was successful in obtaining a STEP student grant for 14 weeks this summer. We have received applications from five students who we will be interviewing over the next few days. You may expect a report at the AGM. We have a number of projects in mind for the summer including the creation of a detailed index of all Council meetings to date. With the significant turnover in AD's it has become clear a good reference source of issues dealt with in the past would serve the Conference well.

As has been the case the past few years, the Office will be staffed for most of the summer. Personally, I shall be out of the country visiting family in Russia June 18 – July 21. We look forward to assisting you with any enquiries throughout the summer months.

Please accept this as my report for the 2008-09 season. Thank you for your many contributions to making our jobs a little easier and more enjoyable to do.

Commissioner's Report

Bill Hendsbee

I have now completed my third full year as Commissioner. Once again, I have enjoyed working with each of you over the last year. Although there have been challenges, I continue to be impressed by your dedication and passion.

My report of December 3, 2008 is attached for your reference. It dealt with significant issues that arose during the first half of this year, including a detailed review of the Men's and Women's Soccer seasons. I have also attached Infraction Summaries for Soccer, Basketball and Hockey for your review.

Of note, in Men's Hockey, game misconducts were down significantly (from 116 to 63).

To date, each of my reports has stressed the importance of maintaining a respectful relationship with our officials. This continues to present a challenge to coaches and players alike. While passion is a requirement at this level of sport, disrespectful or abusive actions towards officials will not be tolerated. Once again, I would like to stress that concerns with the performance or training of game officials should be dealt with through appropriate channels.

I would like to comment on a trend that causes me concern. During the 2008-09 season, I ruled on 25 eligibility issues, which represents four times more eligibility rulings than the previous season. As touched upon in my Fall report, many of these issues were the result of administrative errors and resulted in an unacceptable number of forfeited games in circumstances where otherwise eligible players were not eligible due to administrative errors. I recognize that human resources and time are both in short supply. However, I encourage each of you to take the initiative to review your school's internal policies to ensure that they meet the acceptable ACAC standard.

In conclusion, 2008-09 represented another successful season of ACAC athletics. Although we were presented with a number of issues, it is my opinion that those issues were dealt with professionally by each of you and I thank you for continuing to make this position enjoyable and rewarding.
