## INTRODUCTION

---

2009-10 marked the ACAC's 46<sup>th</sup> year of service in the provision of competitive post - secondary sport opportunities for Alberta's ever expanding college student population. From its humble beginnings in 1964, when five member institutions fielded men's basketball teams in the former Western Inter-College Conference, the ACAC boasted sixteen member institutions in 2009-10. College athletes competed in thirteen athletic activities. The number of annual ACAC participants has correspondingly increased from approximately 50 in 1964-65 to 1,868 in 2009-10. During the course of its existence, the ACAC has positively impacted the lives of over 32,000 individuals by fostering a climate of growth, development and education through competitive sport. Ultimately, many of these ACAC graduates became valuable leaders in the framework of Alberta sport.

By virtue of the fact that ACAC teams and individuals have won more medals than any other provincial college athletic conference in Canadian College Athletics Association (CCAA) national championship competitions, the ACAC is widely regarded as the pre-eminent college athletic conference in Canada. Moreover, over the course of the past year, the Conference has intentionally addressed this goal in review with an eye to maintaining that pre-eminent position into the future! Alberta's post-secondary student athletes are fortunate to have the opportunity to pursue their academic and athletic aspirations at the finest collection of post secondary institutions assembled in any Canadian province.

The Conference is thankful for the support offered by many "partners", most notably the Alberta Sport, Recreation, Parks and Wildlife Foundation and the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund, Alberta Government departments who support financially a large measure of our Conference operations through operational grants and scholarships.

This annual report chronicles the activities and results of the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference during the period of July 1, 2009 through to June 30, 2010. Key developments and activities are described in the "2009-10 in Review" section which follows this introduction and in the Executive Reports found in Appendix I. Appendix II contains the statistical story of 2009-10.

2009 – 2010 in Review

---

 MEMBERSHIP

The number of participating institutions in the ACAC grew to sixteen in 1996-97 with the admission of Briercrest Bible College and The King's University College into the Conference. Briercrest Bible College, located in Caronport, Saskatchewan, was granted "guest playing privileges" and became the first non-Alberta institution to compete in the ACAC. BBC Clipper teams competed in the ACAC's South Division men's and women's basketball and volleyball. The College amended its name to Briercrest College (BC) in 2005. The King's University College, in Edmonton, joined the ACAC's North Division, competing in men's and women's basketball only in 1996-97. In 1997-98, both colleges increased their participation with BBC joining men's hockey and TKUC joining men's and women's volleyball in the North Division. Grant MacEwan Community College also joined men's hockey for the 1997-98 season; Concordia University College of Alberta joined women's and men's basketball in 1999-00 and Portage College joined men's and women's volleyball in 2001-02. Olds College rejoined the ACAC as a guest member in 2001-02 in sports of golf and curling after a seven year absence. The University of Calgary joined in 2002-03 as a guest member in golf and women's hockey while The King's University College and Keyano College joined competition in soccer. Lakeland College joined ACAC competition in basketball in 2003-04. Finally, Grande Prairie Regional College joined the Conference soccer ranks in 2004-5.

The sixteen institutions who participated in the 2009-10 regular season included fourteen private and/or public colleges/universities and two technical institutes. Three institutions were officially designated as university colleges and are among eleven ACAC institutions which have full degree granting status. Furthermore, fourteen institutions were categorized as "full" members of the Conference, one was classified as an "associate" member and one was a "guest" member. The number of activities into which an institution chooses to enter determines membership status. The primary advantage to institutions competing in a greater number of activities, and thus holding full membership status, is the privilege of appointing two voting delegates to the Conference Council, the association's main decision-making body. Associate members are accorded only one voting delegate whereas guest members or institutions that enjoy guest playing privileges are entitled to have speaking privileges but no vote at Conference Council meetings. Associate member Prairie Bible College announced their withdrawal from the Conference prior to the 2005 AGM.

Historically, new inquiries about membership were received in 1996-97 from Flathead Community College in Montana and the College of the Rockies in Cranbrook, B.C. Both of these colleges were informed that the ACAC Conference Council had placed a three-year moratorium (ended in June 2000) on new membership in order to allow the Conference to sufficiently adjust to its most recent expansion. In 1998-99, the ACAC office received new inquiries from Fairview College and Olds College (Olds College is a former member of the ACAC). During the 1999-00 term, St. Mary's College in Calgary and Northwest Bible College in Edmonton inquired about future membership. In 2000-01, Fairview College and Northwest Bible College, again, showed interest but did not

make application to join. Subsequently, new inquiries were received from Northern Lakes College (Slave Lake), Muskwachees Cultural College (Hobbema), as well as the three Alberta Universities (U of A, U of C and U of L). Olds College made a formal application and joined the ACAC as a guest member for 2001-02 in the sports of golf and curling.

During the past four years, membership enquiries were received from St. Mary's College in Calgary and Taylor University (formerly North American Baptist College) in Edmonton. The moratorium on participation was lifted at the May 2006 AGM and new applications were accepted in fall 2006. At the May 2009 AGM, Council approved the addition of five college sport applications: Keyano Basketball (2010-11), Augustana Volleyball (2010-11), Lakeland Soccer (2010-11), MacEwan Golf (2009-10) and Lakeland Cross Country Running (2010-11).

## ADMINISTRATION

The governance and management of the ACAC was efficiently undertaken during the 2009-10 season by an ACAC Executive Committee which included President Wade Kolmel (Keyano), President Elect (Finance) Alan Rogan (Lakeland), Director, Marketing & Communications, Kelly Lamer (MHC), Director, Court Sports, Linda Henderson (NAIT), Director, Non-Court Sports, Karla Karch (Mount Royal) and Past-President Bill Dean (MacEwan). This Committee met on eight occasions between July 1, 2009 and June 30, 2010. Office staff included Interim Executive Director Allan Ferchuk, Executive Assistant Erin Cameron, and Technical Assistant Anthony Wong. Erin and Anthony provided daily professional support to the membership from the ACAC Office. Bill Hendsbee completed his third term in the office of ACAC Commissioner.

The ACAC Conference Council met on two occasions during the 2009-10 academic year. A four-day strategic planning meeting was held at the Sutton Place Hotel in Edmonton in December. The AGM, consisting largely of a business meeting, was held over four days at Medicine Hat College, in Medicine Hat from May 4<sup>th</sup> – 7<sup>th</sup> 2010.

Once again, the Conference was able to achieve a high percentage of the objectives set out for itself in 2009-10 and re-oriented several of the major functions within the office.

## FINANCES

ACAC Vice President, Finance Leigh Goldie supervised the day to day transactions undertaken by Executive Director Bob Day. Together, these individuals capably managed the finances of the ACAC and provided updated information to the membership to enable the Conference to assess the financial status of the ACAC in a more well-informed fashion. Peterson Walker will be contracted to perform an audit of the ACAC's 2000-10 financial records in the late summer of 2010. A significant change in the management of the ACAC's financial accounting records took place in 1996-97 with the employment of Elvi Clark as the ACAC's off-site office accounting consultant. On a monthly basis, Ms. Clark reviews all financial transactions into a Simply Accounting program and produces the monthly and year-end financial reports.

The Alberta Sport, Recreation, Parks and Wildlife Foundation provided the ACAC with a grant of \$163,300.00 for the 2009-10 year. As noted above, this grant is extremely important in helping to reduce ACAC assessments to the individual colleges.

At year-end, the ACAC's overall financial situation resulted in a modest operating surplus intended to augment the Conference reserve which had fallen substantively during the years 2000 to 2003. The goal of the Conference is to establish a financial stabilization fund amounting to two years of ASRPWF grant monies, or \$326,600, with the condition that the funds may only be accessed with Council approval. The intent of the fund is to provide the Conference with a two year period of stable funding should the ASRPWF grant be withdrawn. All operating surpluses are invested into low risk investments which provide protection for the ACAC in the event of any future catastrophic financial crisis.

The significant financial review completed during 2002-3 was intended to avoid future deficits after three consecutive years of deficit budgeting. Notwithstanding these deficits, the Conference presented net assets approximating \$ 353,000 at year end, compared to \$246,000 the previous year! Subsequent to this review, the Conference is now committed to realizing modest surpluses annually until the reserve target amount is realized. This shall be managed by presenting conservative budgets which shall be balanced through the adjustment of membership fees. At the same time, the Conference remains committed in its search for possible marketing revenues, now. The Conference Council elected to implement a three year advance budgeting process in order to attempt to strategically plan for upcoming fiscal changes. This process continues in view of increasing inflationary challenges.

## PARTICIPATION AND COMPETITION RESULTS

In 2009-10, a total of 1,868 male and female athletes competed in twelve sanctioned league or tournament sports. A breakdown of participation by sport, gender and institution can be examined in Table 3 of Appendix II. Final college placements in all activities are located in Table 4 of Appendix II.

Once again, ACAC teams were considered amongst the finest in Canada. For complete CCAA Championship results, see Table 11 of Appendix II.

## INDIVIDUAL HONOURS AND AWARDS

Sixteen ACAC athletes were distinguished as CCAA All-Canadians in their respective sports for the 2009-10 season (see Table 12 Appendix II). In addition, 34 athletes were named CCAA Academic All-Canadians, an award which recognizes those student-athletes who combine athletic and academic excellence (see Table 16 of Appendix II). ACAC athletes truly symbolize the ACAC motto of *"Building Character Through Athletic and Academic Achievement"*.

Other CCAA awards featured in this publication include ACAC athletes chosen as tournament all-stars at the CCAA National Championships (Table 13) and the CCAA Athletes of the Month (Table 14) selected from the ACAC.

Tables 4 through 8 list the recipients of individual ACAC Awards in 2009-10. These tables include the 2 ACAC Athletes of the Year (Table 5), the 18 ACAC Players of the Year (Table 6), the 182 All-Conference Award recipients (Table 7), the 19 ACAC Coaches of the Year (Table 8) and the 296 ACAC Academic Athletic Award recipients (Table 9).

## FINANCIAL AID TO ATHLETES

Financial aid received by ACAC athletes through the Jimmie Condon Scholarship program administered by the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund totaled over \$1.9 million for the 2009-10 activity year. A complete scholarship breakdown by sport and institution is located in Table 17 of Appendix II.

The ACAC would like to acknowledge the significant financial support provided by the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund through the Jimmie Condon Scholarship program.

### A SUMMARY OF KEY ACAC DEVELOPMENTS IN 2009-10

- Four ACAC member institutions hosted CCAA National Championships in 2009-10 as Keyano College was host of the 2008-9 CCAA Men's Volleyball Championships in March.
- The financial foundation of the Conference was assured once again by the Alberta Sport, Recreation Parks & Wildlife Foundation by their contribution of a grant in the amount of \$163,300 for the administration of college sport in Alberta.
- **adidas, Sher-Wood Hockey and Elite Sportswear** of Edmonton continued to support the Conference through "in kind" sponsorship and in the case of the latter two, \$500 scholarships for our top hockey and basketball players. *adidas* assumed the title sponsorship of the ACAC Soccer Championships.
- **Konica Minolta** remained as an ACAC sponsor, providing two plain paper fax machines for use at the ACAC office and the Commissioner's office, a photocopy machine for the ACAC office and two, \$500 scholarships for our top volleyball players.
- The Conference introduced new two year agreements with 10 hotel properties as host hotels for the next two seasons.
- In December, 2007 launched an internal governance review resulting in the formation of a Task Force mandated to review how the Conference governs itself with an eye to (1) becoming more administratively efficient and (2) preparing a portal for the future growth and development of the Conference into the 21<sup>st</sup> Century.

- At the May 2010 AGM, Council approved the addition of five college sport applications: Keyano Basketball (2010-11), Augustana Volleyball (2010-11), Lakeland Soccer (2010-11), MacEwan Golf (2009-10) and Lakeland Cross Country Running (2010-11).

### ACAC Sport Consultant Report ACAC May 2010 Council Meeting

#### A. Introduction

It has been my pleasure to return to the ACAC and work with the membership. The commitment of athletic directors and institutional staff to providing student-athletes with high quality sport and educational environments is to be applauded. I have been very impressed with the conference governance initiative and the incredible commitment shown on a day to day basis by the executive and committee members. President Wade Kolmel and president-elect Al Rogan provided outstanding leadership and an incredible amount of time and commitment to ensure the key decisions were made and staff was supported. I would like to take this opportunity to recognize and thank Greg Ryan, Ken Schildroth, Mark Pretzlaff and Greg Meropoulis for the excellent manner in which they hosted CCAA Nationals. It was a credit to your championship committees, your institutions and the ACAC, thank you!

To Anthony and Erin, thank you for accepting the administrative and leadership challenges and excelling in the performance of your regular and additional duties. It is a credit to Bob Day that he had developed an ACAC office team that was capable of excelling in what were, at times, difficult circumstances.

On a personal basis, it has been a substantive learning experience to move from management positions that have been institutionally based to a centralized office for a provincial organization. Communication and relationship-building on a personal level require a unique group of team dynamics skills.

In the upcoming years the Conference will face several new challenges and/or opportunities. The financial realities of educational based budgets, the ASRPWF funding in the context of a new policy direction, "Active Alberta"; the change in the status of Mount Royal and MacEwan and the CIS/CCAA discussions; a higher profile for elite sport within Canada at the professional and Olympic team level and ever higher consumer expectations, all will place additional demands on each institutions athletic programs.

#### B. Consultant Contracted Tasks Review: January to April, 2010

##### **I. Provide leadership and management of the ACAC office employee team.**

In the second semester I was in the ACAC office bi-weekly and kept in daily communication with office personnel by phone and/or email. At times this distance office management process offered challenges to both Anthony and Erin I am sure; but due to their level of competence and dedication the office ran smoothly. The conference members in the year end survey expressed 100% satisfaction with the past year's office operations. The very real challenge is to move forward with the office to meet the on-going operational demands and the new challenges as the conference strives to attain the "ends" as outlined in its' strategic plan.

**II. Support functions to the ACAC executive and major committees.**

The ACAC president and president elect handled most of the major conference issues often in consultation with the standing committee chairs. I believe that I executed a significant supportive and reasoned consultant role to the committee chairs and to them as an executive group. I believe a professional, challenging but mutually supportive team approach was developed amongst the senior executive group. This will provide an excellent model and building block for future conference volunteers in the governance leadership positions.

**III. ACAC commissioner liaison and support.**

The conference commissioner functions in an independent, reasoned manner with excellent insights into the competitive sport culture. I interacted with Bill in less than a dozen occasions over the year. On two occasions these were ad hoc committees formed as per the Operating Code to deal with exceptional discipline or sport character issues. Quite frankly, I anticipated a much larger role in this area. The conference is truly fortunate to have Bill Hendsbee as commissioner; his application of legalistic processes and willingness to assist each of us in our education of correct due process is a huge benefit to each of us, individually and to the conference as a whole.

**IV. Serving as ACAC point of contact for media, external stakeholders and internal stakeholders where appropriate.**

This was the single most important area of contribution to the conference in the duties I performed this semester. The Conference relationships with the Heritage Scholarship Board and ASRPWF have been very well nurtured by Bob Day and

past executives members. In these times of economic constraints we are challenged with fiscal realities, but I truly feel that we continue to be fundamentally supported and that as a result, immediate and long term effects were minimized.

I was disappointed and surprised by the limited interaction with media in my role as Interim Executive Director. This was especially apparent during our provincial championships and speaks to a loss of continuity during Bob's leave but more truthfully hi-lights the conference need to become relevant on a province wide basis.

**V. Complete revision of ACAC By-Laws with integration of ACAC Strategic Plan.**

I was able to secure the assistance of the law firm of Johnston, Ming, and Manning LLP and with significant input of executive committee members Almer, Kolmel and Rogan we have before council a By-law draft which integrates our incorporated status with our new governance model.

**VI. Review ACAC Staffing; Develop Staff Positions Manual and update ACAC Staff Policy Handbook.**

During this past year office staff have completed a weekly chronology of time on tasks, nature of tasks, mutually supportive duties and a critique of conference compliance matters which cost the governance time and money. The input of post game results, the inaccuracy of game reports, the tardiness of awards input are significant "resource" wasters within the ACAC.

I am in the process of presenting to Executive Committee a draft 1 of an updated ACAC Staff Manual. Within the manual are updated position descriptions, benefits details, compliance regulations with Alberta labor and an outline of the staff review processes.

**VII. Review implementation of new governance model and make recommendations for Council consideration.**

I will be pleased to share with the conference the results of the ACAC survey which was constructed to allow for confidential feedback of membership perceptions of the 2009-10 implementation of the new governance model, our achievement of and re-priorization of the key core strategies and the "team culture" of the ACAC.

These results have been utilized in my consultant's presentation that will proceed

the conference professional development afternoon.

C. Conclusion

I very much appreciated the manner in which you as Directors of Athletics handle your relationships with us in the ACAC office. On a personal basis the relationships are in the large part outstanding. On functionality basis there remains a challenge to commit to the priorities of the conference and concurrently the priorities/ demands on our home campus. Once one has gained experience in major conference governance capacity, this need to balance priorities becomes easier to understand and address on a personal level of commitment. The participation of each conference member in a post-secondary athletic conference of excellence automatically contributes to the strength and credibility of their own program. Likewise the opposite is true; a weak conference begets weak member athletic programs.

## **Commissioner's Report Bill Hendsbee**

---

I have now completed my fourth full year as Commissioner. Once again, I have enjoyed working with each of you over the last year and I greatly appreciate your hard work and dedication, which makes my job as Commissioner easier and more enjoyable.

My report of December 4, 2009 is attached for your reference. It dealt with significant issues that arose during the first half of this year, including a detailed review of the Men's and Women's Soccer seasons. I have also attached Infraction Summaries for Soccer, Basketball and Hockey for your review.

In many ways, this past year was much smoother than previous years. There were certainly less discipline cases involving violence. My only significant ongoing concern, which I have expressed in each of my past reports, deals with the importance of maintaining a respectful relationship with our officials. I continue to be concerned that the level of tension between athletes, coaches and officials continues to escalate. Once again, I would like to stress that concerns with the performance or training of game officials should be dealt with through appropriate channels, and not during the heat of the moment, as commonly occurs.

I would also like to comment on a positive trend. During the 2008-09 season, I ruled on 25 eligibility issues, which represented four times more eligibility rulings than the previous season, many of which stemmed from administrative errors. As you will note from the attached summary, eligibility cases decreased significantly over the last year and I commend your efforts to improve in that area.

In conclusion, 2009-10 represented another successful season of ACAC athletics. Thank you all for helping us to achieve this level of success.
