Mission Statement

The ACAC is the governing body for intercollegiate athletics in Alberta. Its mission is to foster the development of the student-athlete through the administration and promotion of intercollegiate athletics as part of the educational experience and provide a leadership role in the development of sport in Alberta.

Motto

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INTRODUCTION

2010-11 marked the ACAC's 47th year of service in the provision of competitive post - secondary sport opportunities for Alberta's ever expanding college student population. From its humble beginnings in 1964, when five member institutions fielded men's basketball teams in the former Western Inter-College Conference, the ACAC boasted sixteen member institutions in 2010-11. College athletes competed in thirteen athletic activities. The number of annual ACAC participants has correspondingly increased from approximately 50 in 1964-65 to 2,032 in 2010-11. During the course of its existence, the ACAC has positively impacted the lives of over 34,000 individuals by fostering a climate of growth, development and education through competitive sport. Ultimately, many of these ACAC graduates became valuable leaders in the framework of Alberta sport.

By virtue of the fact that ACAC teams and individuals have won more medals than any other provincial college athletic conference in Canadian Collegiate Athletics Association (CCAA) national championship competitions, the ACAC is widely regarded as the pre-eminent college athletic conference in Canada. Moreover, over the course of the past year, the Conference has intentionally addressed this goal in review with an eye to maintaining that pre-eminent position into the future! Alberta's post-secondary student athletes are fortunate to have the opportunity to pursue their academic and athletic aspirations at the finest collection of post secondary institutions assembled in any Canadian province.

The Conference is thankful for the support offered by many "partners", most notably the Alberta Sport, Recreation, Parks and Wildlife Foundation and the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund, Alberta Government departments who financially support a large measure of our Conference operations through operational grants and scholarships. In addition, the Conference remains pleased to enjoy the support of the Alberta Scholarship Programs through the Jimmie Condon Scholarship Program, where 1,412 scholarships were awarded in 2010-11 totaling \$2,218,500.

This annual report chronicles the activities and results of the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference during the period of July 1, 2010 through to June 30, 2011. Key developments and activities are described in the "2010-11 in Review" section which follows this introduction and in the Executive Reports found in Appendix I. Appendix II contains the statistical story of 2010-11.

2010 – 2011 in Review

MEMBERSHIP

The number of participating institutions in the ACAC grew to sixteen in 1996-97 with the admission of Briercrest Bible College and The King's University College into the Conference.

Briercrest Bible College, located in Caronport, Saskatchewan, was granted "guest playing privileges" and became the first non-Alberta institution to compete in the ACAC. BBC Clipper teams competed in the ACAC's South Division men's and women's basketball and volleyball. The College amended its name to Briercrest College (BC) in 2005.

The King's University College, in Edmonton, joined the ACAC's North Division, competing in men's and women's basketball only in 1996-97. In 1997-98, both colleges increased their participation with BBC joining men's hockey and TKUC joining men's and women's volleyball in the North Division.

Grant MacEwan Community College also joined men's hockey for the 1997-98 season; Concordia University College of Alberta joined women's and men's basketball in 1999-00 and Portage College joined men's and women's volleyball in 2001-02. Olds College rejoined the ACAC as a guest member in 2001-02 in sports of golf and curling after a seven year absence. The University of Calgary joined in 2002-03 as a guest member in golf and women's hockey while The King's University College and Keyano College joined competition in soccer. Lakeland College joined ACAC competition in basketball in 2003-04. Finally, Grande Prairie Regional College joined the Conference soccer ranks in 2004-5.

In 2010-11, the Conference welcomed new participation from Concordia in volleyball, Keyano in basketball and Olds in X-C running. Several schools participated in futsal which was introduced formally into the Conference in January, 2011 after one successful exhibition season in 2009-10. The conference will welcome new member Ambrose University College of Calgary whose membership application was approved at the 2011 May AGM and who will commence play in futsal in 2011-12. Unfortunately, the Conference will lose charter member Mount Royal University in 2012-13 as they have been accepted into Canada West of the CIS. The Conference wishes to congratulate MRU and thank them for their many contributions to the Conference, both on the court and in the boardroom! Several additional new teams are scheduled to begin play in 2012-13.

The sixteen institutions who participated in the 2010-11 regular season included fourteen private and/or public colleges/universities and two technical institutes. Three institutions were officially designated as university colleges and are among eleven ACAC

institutions which have full degree granting status. Furthermore, fourteen institutions were categorized as "full" members of the Conference, one was classified as an "associate" member and one as a "guest" member. The number of activities into which an institution chooses to enter determines membership status. The primary advantage to institutions competing in a greater number of activities, and thus holding full membership status, is the privilege of appointing two voting delegates to the Conference Council, the association's main decision-making body. Associate members are accorded only one voting delegate whereas guest members, or institutions that enjoy guest playing privileges, are entitled to have speaking privileges but no vote at Conference Council meetings. Associate member Prairie Bible College announced their withdrawal from the Conference prior to the 2005 AGM.

Historically, new inquiries about membership were received in 1996-97 from Flathead Community College in Montana and the College of the Rockies in Cranbrook, B.C. Both of these colleges were informed that the ACAC Conference Council had placed a three-year moratorium (ended in June 2000) on new membership in order to allow the Conference to sufficiently adjust to its most recent expansion. In 1998-99, the ACAC Office received new inquiries from Fairview College and Olds College (Olds College was a former member of the ACAC). During the 1999-00 term, St. Mary's College in Calgary and Northwest Bible College in Edmonton inquired about future membership. In 2000-01, Fairview College and Northwest Bible College, again, showed interest but did not make application to join. Subsequently, new inquiries were received from Northern Lakes College (Slave Lake), Muskawchees Cultural College (Hobbema), as well as the three Alberta Universities (U of A, U of C and U of L). Olds College made a formal application and rejoined the ACAC as a guest member for 2001-02 in the sports of golf and curling.

During the past four years, membership enquiries were received from St. Mary's College in Calgary and Taylor University (formerly North American Baptist College) in Edmonton. The moratorium on participation was lifted at the May 2006 AGM and new applications were accepted in fall 2006. At the May 2009 AGM, Council approved the addition of five college sport applications: Keyano Basketball (2010-11), Augustana Volleyball (2010-11), Lakeland Soccer (2010-11), MacEwan Golf (2009-10) and Lakeland Cross Country Running (2010-11). Since then several new programs have been approved as noted above. As noted too, Ambrose College was approved for Guest Membership this past year.

ADMINISTRATION

The governance and management of the ACAC was efficiently undertaken during the 2010-11 season by the ACAC Executive Committee which included President Alan Rogan (Lakeland); Past President Wade Kolmel (Keyano); President-Elect (Finance) Kelly Almer (MHC) (who subsequently resigned), Director, Marketing & Communications, Keith Hansen (RDC); Director, Court Sports, Francis Fournier (GPRC), Director, Non-Court Sports, Karla Karch (Mount Royal) and General Manager, Robert Day. This Committee

met on eight occasions between July 1, 2010 and June 30, 2011. Office staff included Executive Assistant Erin Cameron, maternity replacement Kelly Schmidt (Nov. 1/10 –

June 30/11) and Technical Assistant Anthony Wong. Erin, Kelly and Anthony provided daily professional support to the membership from the ACAC Office. Bill Hendsbee completed his fourth term in the office of ACAC Commissioner.

The ACAC Conference Council met on two occasions during the 2010-11 academic year. A four-day strategic planning meeting was held at the San Diego Convention Center in conjunction with the annual Athletic Business Conference held there in December. The AGM, consisting largely of a business meeting, was held over four days at Augustana Faculty, University of Alberta, in Camrose from May 3rd – 5th 2011.

Once again, the Conference was able to achieve a high percentage of the objectives set out for itself in 2010-11 and re-oriented several of the major functions within the office as a result of the revised governance format which was introduced by the Conference during the 2009-10 season.

FINANCES

ACAC Vice President, Finance Kelly Almer oversaw the day to day transactions undertaken by General Manager Robert Day. Together, these individuals capably managed the finances of the ACAC and provided updated information to the membership to enable the Conference to assess the financial status of the Conference in a more well-informed fashion. Peterson Walker will be contracted to perform an audit of the ACAC's 2010-11 financial records in the late summer of 2011. A significant change in the management of the ACAC's financial accounting records took place in 1996-97 with the employment of Elvi Clark as the ACAC's off-site office accounting consultant. On a monthly basis, Ms. Clark reviews all financial transactions into a Simply Accounting program and produces the monthly and year-end financial reports.

The Alberta Sport, Recreation, Parks and Wildlife Foundation provided the ACAC with a grant of \$163,300.00 for the 2010-11 year. As noted above, this grant is extremely important in helping to reduce ACAC assessments to the individual colleges.

At year-end, the ACAC's overall financial situation resulted in a modest operating surplus intended to augment the Conference Reserve Fund which had fallen substantively during the years 2000 to 2003. The goal of the Conference is to establish a financial stabilization fund amounting to two years of ASRPWF grant monies, or \$326,600, with the condition that the funds may only be accessed with Council approval. The intent of the fund is to provide the Conference with a two year period of stable funding should the ASRPWF grant be withdrawn. All operating surpluses are invested into low risk investments which provide protection for the ACAC in the event of any future catastrophic financial crisis. We are pleased to report that owing to the Council-mandated transfer of surplus funds (resulting from fiscal management between

2002-2010), effective December 31, 2011, the Reserve Fund will meet this \$326,600 goal!

The significant financial review completed during 2002-03 was intended to avoid future deficits after three consecutive years of deficit budgeting. Notwithstanding these deficits, the Conference presented net assets approximating \$353,000 at year end, compared to \$246,000 the previous year! Subsequent to this review, the Conference became committed to realizing modest surpluses annually until the reserve target amount is realized. This was managed by presenting conservative budgets which were balanced through the adjustment of membership fees. At the same time, the Conference remains committed in its search for possible marketing revenues. At the time, the Conference Council elected to implement a three year advance budgeting process in order to attempt to strategically plan for upcoming fiscal changes. This process has been continued however in view of increasing inflationary challenges, member general assessment fees have not increased over the past two years (although sport assessment fees have increased owing to steadily increasing officials costs, particularly in basketball and volleyball.

PARTICIPATION AND COMPETITION RESULTS

In 2010-11, a total of 2,032 male and female athletes competed in thirteen sanctioned league or tournament sports up from 1,868 in 2009-10. A breakdown of participation by sport, gender and institution can be examined in Table 3 of Appendix II. Final college placements in all activities are located in Table 4 of Appendix II.

Once again, ACAC teams were considered amongst the finest in Canada. For complete CCAA Championship results, see Table 11 of Appendix II.

INDIVIDUAL HONOURS AND AWARDS

Fifteen ACAC athletes were distinguished as CCAA All-Canadians in their respective sports for the 2010-11 season (see Table 12 Appendix II). In addition, 33 athletes were named CCAA Academic All-Canadians, an award which recognizes those student-athletes who combine athletic and academic excellence (see Table 16 of Appendix II). ACAC athletes truly symbolize the ACAC motto of *"Building Character Through Athletic and Academic Achievement"*.

Other CCAA awards featured in this publication include ACAC athletes chosen as tournament all-stars at the CCAA National Championships (Table 13) and the CCAA Athletes of the Month (Table 14) selected from the ACAC.

Tables 4 through 8 list the recipients of individual ACAC Awards in 2010-11. These tables include the 2 ACAC Athletes of the Year (Table 5), the 18 ACAC Players of the

Year (Table 6), the 182 All-Conference Award recipients (Table 7), the 19 ACAC Coaches of the Year (Table 8) and the 343 ACAC Academic Athletic Award recipients (there were 298 in 2010—09-10) (Table 9).

FINANCIAL AID TO ATHLETES

Financial aid received by ACAC athletes through the Jimmie Condon Scholarship program administered by the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund totaled over \$2.2 million for the 2010-11 activity year. A complete scholarship breakdown by sport and institution is located in Table 17 of Appendix II.

The ACAC would like to acknowledge the significant financial support provided by the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund through the Jimmie Condon Scholarship program.

A SUMMARY OF KEY ACAC DEVELOPMENTS IN 2010-11

- NAIT hosted the CCAA National Soccer Championships in 2010-11. Keyano College was host of the 2008-09 CCAA Men's Volleyball Championships in March.
- The financial foundation of the Conference was assured once again by the Alberta Sport, Recreation Parks & Wildlife Foundation by their contribution of a grant in the amount of \$163,300 for the administration of college sport in Alberta.
- *Sher-Wood Hockey and Elite Sportswear* of Edmonton continued to support the Conference through "in kind" sponsorship; both donating two \$500 scholarships for our top hockey and basketball players. Additional Player of the Year sponsorships were received from Volleyball Alberta, the Alberta Curling Federation and Dallas Framing.
- *Konica Minolta* remained as an ACAC sponsor, providing a plain paper fax machine for use at the Commissioner's office and a photocopy/fax machine for the ACAC office which offset \$500 scholarships for our top X-C running, soccer and volleyball Players of the Year.
- The Conference introduced new two year agreements with 10 hotel properties as host hotels for the next two seasons.
- At the May, 2011 AGM, Council approved the addition of five college sport applications: Ambrose Futsal (2011-12), Keyano Men's Hockey (2012-13), Olds Basketball (2012-13) and St. Mary's Basketball (2012-13)



General Manager's Report Dr. Robert D. Day

The ACAC has completed its 47th year of competition and has rendered exceptional competition and some fine results at the CCAA national championships. Congratulations to our medalists and to all those who have achieved academic laurels, both provincially and nationally. Congratulations too to NAIT for their fine hosting of the CCAA National Women's and Men's Soccer Championships! 2011-12 will see the Conference host the CCAA National Women's Basketball Championships at Lethbridge College March 15-17, 2012. By the way, we should perhaps start to consider how best to celebrate/highlight our 50th year!

The year was again marked by significant issues in a number of areas including athlete eligibility including the use of improperly registered, but otherwise eligible athletes, concerns and suggestions of questionable recruiting practices and once again, the need to orient and train new staff in the ACAC Office. Noteworthy was the fact the Conference received three new sport applications, all of which have received positive recommendations from their respective ad hoc evaluation committees, as well as one which is pending which may also again be reviewed favourably. Unfortunately however, the spectra of losing a most valued member overshadows our upcoming meeting as we await word on the application of MRU to Canada West and the CIS. While we applaud the Cougars focus on being the best program they can be, and competing at the highest level, we regret we may well lose as a member of the ACAC the most successful athletic program in CCAA history!

During 2010-11 too, the workload of the Commissioner, Bill Hendsbee, was significant and may even have eclipsed the amount of work during the record setting 2007-8 season. The year saw several successful appeals to Commissioner rulings which suggested a need for revision of the Conference Operating Code, a job which has been tackled by the Conference's Governance & Finance Committee. Increasingly, members have chosen to challenge decisions made by the Commissioner as is their right, and that, when combined with recent Code changes enabling members to seek supplemental discipline after the conclusion of a match, may place a more severe demand on this part-time position.

From the office perspective, the second year of the revised policy governance model has been successful in including more and more member personnel in the day to day operations and decision-making within the Conference. To date, much of this involvement remains "means" oriented rather than "ends" oriented however. As a result, more "work" is being created as changes in operations are made. Attaining consistency in reports and records too is creating new challenges. Most importantly however, the revised governance model has succeeded in engaging our membership in the leadership of the Conference both on the Executive and in committee work. We look forward to seeing this level of involvement contribute increasingly to the stewardship of the Conference!

Your Executive Committee served the Conference well during the year and while we look forward with anticipation to the introduction of the revised Executive slate, we bid adieu with gratitude to Executive Committee members Kelly Almer, as Chair of the Governance and Finance Committee, and Wade Kolmel, as Chair of the Leadership Committee. Their leadership has been appreciated.

There have been a number of other significant things that have occurred to date this year:

Sport Applications: You have received under separate cover a PDF document including positive recommendations on four new applications received last fall and four intermediary sport program reviews. While the review of these has made for a busy semester, we are encouraged by the development of the Conference. Thank you's to those members who served on the various ad hoc evaluation committees.

Project Zero: Project Zero was envisaged and designed as a potential sustainable fundraising venture for the Conference based on the RSEQ's (formerly FOSE) "De Facto" anti-smoking campaign, which was believed to garner sponsorship annually for the Quebec conference.

While I was pleased to research, design, organize and manage Project Zero as part of my return to modified duties in the spring of 2010, the actual training of member staff was completed after my return to full-time work May 1 and the program was implemented with the start of the 2010-11 season in July. This created a significant additional workload in the fall semester as development of certain aspects of the program lagged into the new operational year. In addition, the gathering of project data and results and the preparation of the final report impacted the normal work of the office, and particularly of the General Manager, during the busy fall semester.

While the project was effectively targeted and designed, it turned out to be too demanding for the membership to activate it successfully. On that basis, it was determined not to make application for funding when it became available late in the fall semester. It is noteworthy however the Conference did receive a "Blue Ribbon Award" from the Tobacco Reduction Unit of Alberta Health Services for Project Zero!

Fiscal Situation: The Conference continues to find itself in a solid fiscal position. The Director of the Governance & Finance Committee K. Almer reported in December that operations were proceeding as planned. Moreover, the 2010-11 Financial Statement, approved by the Council at the December Planning Meeting, showed the Conference to be in a very solid position with net assets of \$429,317.

The Conference held a casino in November and realized \$71,588 (compared to \$80,989 in 2008), below the budgeted amount of \$80,000. This \$8,400 deficit, divided over two years in actual operations, should be absorbed for the most part in the 2010-11 budget, where all casino revenue is reported. Accordingly, the 2011-12 budget has been adjusted to reflect an intended \$35,800 deficit rather than a planned \$40,000 deficit.

As of this summer, the Conference Reserve Fund will finally reach the Conference goal of representing two times our 2008-09 ASRPWF operating grant. I am particularly pleased the Conference has reached this long-established goal! The Fund, which sits currently at approximately \$324,000, will reach the Council-mandated level of \$326,600 by mid-July, 2011. Again, the purpose of the Reserve Fund is to allow the Conference to conduct "normal" business operations for a two year period in the event provincial government funding is reduced or withdrawn. Despite the reduction in ASRPWF funding in 2009-10 which continues today, the Council has elected at this time not to dip into the Reserve Fund to make up for this shortfall but to attempt to reduce expenditures instead. In December, the Conference will realize some \$10,000 in interest revenue from the Reserve Fund and these monies will be accounted for in the revenue side of the budget and then will be transferred into the Conference operating budget each January.

Members will note the proposed 2011-12 budget represents a \$0 increase in general assessments for the membership. This is accounted for by decreases to several expense account line items in the proposed budget. Despite the recommendations of the Governance Task Force, no staffing growth is recommended. As it stands, the budget is extremely frugal.

ACAC Commissioner: As noted above, Commissioner Bill Hendsbee has experienced another increase in ACAC-related business this year, that after continual increases in workload over the past four years. Bill continues to receive regular and substantive support from the Conference TA and GM. There has been an unusually high number of eligibility rulings and as you know, unfortunately several institutional sanctions relating to eligibility were imposed. Bill has done a fine job to date and has remained cognizant of Council's wishes that cases be disposed of in an expeditious fashion. He continues to do so in almost every case. You have received his report. Bill has indicated intends to return for another year subject to his evaluation.

ConfLink v. 2.0: The single most frustrating aspect of the 2010-11 season for the office staff, and perhaps for the Executive Committee as well, has been the development of the updated version of ConfLink. Owing to faulty assumptions being made by the ACAC Office staff last summer, and as you know, the ConfLink v. 2.0 was not ready for primetime presentation to the member office assistants as scheduled in late August. Since that time, we have struggled with the developer as deadline after deadline has elapsed and the system is not operational, not "bug" free. The developer has now re-located overseas for the next five months but has promised to have more time to devote to completing the system in anticipation of a "soft" launch in time for the AGM. We still intend to demonstrate it briefly at that time. At time of writing, April 27, the system is functional however it is not error-free and is not particularly easy to navigate. The revised system is close but is not yet complete! Incidentally, we have not yet paid any of the invoice.

ACAC Office Staffing: It's fair to say the revolving door staffing of the EA position in the ACAC Office continues to be the norm rather than the exception as we welcomed our seventh person in that position in the past nine years. The accompanying stress is palpable. The arrival of Kelly Schmidt in November, when combined with the part-time work schedule of Erin Cameron through early November, necessitated substantive time being spent in job sharing, staff training and orientation for A. Wong and myself.

We are pleased with how we have juggled our responsibilities during the year, particularly as the workloads for the TA and GM are excessive as overtime is the norm rather than the exception. We continue to strive to provide exceptional service for the Conference. However, the most dramatic effect of this reduced staffing model and staff changeover, when combined with significantly increased workloads associated with the new governance structure, is that we do not feel we are in control of our business and the levels of stress continue to rise. Our work is seen to be done in more of a reactionary and less of a planned way. This is counter-productive and over time, wears on the individual employee(s) affected.

Again, I am particularly pleased with the job Anthony Wong has done for the Conference. Anthony bore a tremendous burden in 2009-10 when the ED was not in the office owing to an extended sick leave and the EA was working only three days per week. While he did not emerge from that year unscathed, Anthony ensured that the most signal aspects of the office operations ran. It was a huge load to place on his shoulders. He also contributed again during the August-November period this year when he assisted the GM in largely covering off for EA duties two days each week. Kelly Schmidt has assumed her position well.

I have recommended as part of the Staffing Model review that the TA position grid be upgraded to more accurately represent the unique nature of the position and the special skill set it requires. Frankly, while it has been possible to replace the EA position regularly and somewhat easily as you have heard above, it would be a much more daunting task to replace the TA. Also, it is a much more demanding and responsible position and member personnel are much more dependent on that position for their operations. In addition, the office staff have recommended that a fourth full-time position, that of Program Co-ordinator, be added to the staffing complement at the earliest possible time.

At this time, E. Cameron is scheduled to return to the Office November 10, 2011 although she is not bound to inform us of her intentions until approximately September 23. Kelly Schmidt is contracted to remain in the Office until October 30.

As has been the case the past few years, the Office will be staffed for most of the summer. Personally, I shall be working half days, mornings only, July 4 – August 12. Kelly shall be away July 15-27 and Anthony's vacation plans are as yet undetermined. We look forward to assisting you with any enquiries throughout the summer months.

Please accept this as my report for the 2010-11 season. Thank you for your many contributions to making our jobs a little easier and more enjoyable to do.

Commissioner's Report Bill Hendsbee

This marks the completion of my fifth year as Commissioner. Once again, I have enjoyed working with each of you over the last year and I appreciate the effort each of you has made to assist me in my role.

My report of November 16, 2010 is attached for your reference. It dealt with any issues that arose during the first half of this year, including a detailed review of the Men's and Women's Soccer seasons. I have also attached Infraction Summaries for Soccer, Basketball and Hockey for your review.

My review of the discipline statistics for 2010-11 reveals nothing out of the ordinary. I noticed no significant upward trends. In fact, technical fouls in Men's and Women's Basketball were both down noticeably, even with the addition of Keyano College this season.

In my opinion, the most significant eligibility issue I dealt with this year involved the use of University of Lethbridge and ACAD students by SAIT athletic teams. The purpose of raising this case is not to disagree with the ruling of the Appeal Committee, which overturned my decision. However, the case is an illustration of problems with the wording of the Operating Code. Over the course of my tenure, there have been numerous changes to the wording of the Operating Code. It goes without saying that the governance of the ACAC is done on a volunteer basis and that the composition of the Council changes regularly. Under the circumstances, the Conference runs remarkably well. However, I am concerned that changes made to certain sections of the Operating Code meant to address specific issues run the risk of having unintended adverse effects when applied to the facts of a different issue.

Based on the above, I have three specific recommendations:

1. That the Council exercise caution when contemplating further changes to the Operating Code and make every effort to anticipate all possible impacts of those changes before enacting them;
2. I also recommend a full review of the Operating Code in an effort to anticipate possible issues and to suggest any required changes. Subject to time constraints, it would be my suggestion that ACAC General Manager Bob Day would be the appropriate person to carry out this task; and
3. Following the review of the Operating Code referenced above, I ask Council to consider the possibility of appointing a standing Operating Code Review Committee. This committee would be tasked with, among other things, drafting the wording of any proposed Operating Code changes, taking into account the possible ramifications of those changes to other sections of the Operating Code.

I look forward to an ongoing relationship with all of you as we continue to advance the best interests of the ACAC.
